We have audited the accompanying general purpose financial statements of the Convention and Visitors' Bureau, Hancock County, (a division of a nonprofit organization) as of and for the years ended December 31, 2001 and 2000, as listed in the table of contents. These general purpose financial statements are the responsibility of the Bureau's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these general purpose financial statements based on our audits.

We conducted our audits in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audits provide a reasonable basis for our opinion.

In our opinion, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Convention and Visitors' Bureau, Hancock County, as of December 31, 2001 and 2000, and the results of its operations and the cash flows of its proprietary fund type for the years then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated April 3, 2002, on our consideration of the Convention and Visitors' Bureau, Hancock County's internal control over financial reporting and our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulation, contracts, and grants. A. Reporting Entity

The Hancock County Commissioners enacted Resolution 1988-336 and 1988-337 on December 22, 1988. These ordinances authorized Hancock County to enter into agreement with the Findlay Hancock County Chamber of Commerce (Chamber) to provide for the operations of Convention and Visitor's Bureau (the Bureau). These ordinances also levy a hotel-motel tax to fund this contract. The purpose of the Bureau is the promotion and publicizing of Hancock County, including the City of Findlay, in order to bring the patronage of business and tourists and cultural, educational, religious, professional, and sports organizations into the County. The contract is a three-year agreement, beginning January 1, 1992 and ending December 31, 1995. In the event of termination, any and all monies remaining originally received from the County shall be returned to the General Fund of the County. The contract is renewable for the periods of one year thereafter and is currently extended until December 31, 2001.

Beginning in 2002, the Chamber entered into a new one-year agreement with the County in which the Bureau will receive the full 3% tax assessed by the County from hotels and motels. The spending of such funds must promote and publicize Hancock County. The Chamber may not use said funds to make grants to other organizations. The new agreement expires December 31, 2002.

The Bureau operates as a component unit of the Chamber. The Chamber's Board of Directors is responsible for approval of the budget of the Bureau, hiring employees, approving expenditures, and signing the checks of the Bureau. When the Chamber makes expenditures on behalf of the Bureau, the Chamber prepares an invoice. The Bureau then writes a check to reimburse the Chamber based on the invoice. All transactions that are considered "at arms length" are based on substantive documentation, and are recorded on the books of the Bureau. The Bureau paid \$137,673 in 2001 and \$113,457 in 2000 to the Chamber for salaries, fringe benefits, rent, insurance, telephone, postage, travel expenses, and reimbursement of some of the program expenses.

B. Summary Of Significant Accounting Policies

The financial statements of the Bureau have been prepared in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) as applied to governmental units. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) is the accepted standard setting body for establishing governmental accounting and financial reporting principles. The Bureau also applies Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) statements and interpretations issued on or before December 31, 2001, to its proprietary activities provided they do not conflict with or contradict GASB pronouncements. The more significant of the Bureau's accounting policies are described below.

Basis of Presentation – Fund Accounting

The Bureau uses funds to report on its financial position and the results of its operations. Fund accounting is designed to demonstrate legal compliance and to aid financial management by segregating transactions related to certain Bureau functions or activities.

A fund is defined as a fiscal and accounting entity with a self-balancing set of accounts recording cash and other financial resources, together with all related liabilities and residual entities or balances, and changes therein, which are segregated for the purpose of carrying on specific activities or attaining certain objectives in accordance with special restrictions or limitations.

Basis of Presentation – Fund Accounting (Continued)

For financial statement presentation purposes, the various funds of the Bureau are grouped into the following generic fund types under the broad fund categories proprietary and fiduciary.

*Proprietary Fund Type:*

Proprietary funds are used to account for the Bureau's ongoing activities which are similar to those found in the private sector. The following is the Bureau's proprietary fund type:

*Enterprise Funds* - Enterprise funds are used to account for operations that are financed and operated in a manner similar to private business enterprises where the intent is that the costs (expenses, including depreciation) of providing goods and services to the general public on a continuing basis be financed or recovered primarily through user charges or where it has been decided that periodic determination of revenues earned, expenses incurred, and/or net income is appropriate for capital maintenance, public policy, management control, accountability, or other purposes.

Measurement Focus and Basis of Accounting

The accounting and financial reporting treatment applied to a fund is determined by its management focus. All enterprise funds are accounted for on a flow of economic resources management focus. With this measurement focus, all assets and all liabilities associated with the operation of these funds are included on the balance sheet. Fund equity (i.e. net total assets) is segregated into contributed capital and retained earnings components. Enterprise funds' operating statements present increases (e.g., revenues) and decreases (e.g., expenses) in net total assets.

Basis of accounting refers to when revenues and expenditures or expenses are recognized in the accounts and reported in the financial statements and the timing of the measurement made.

The accrual basis of accounting is utilized for reporting purposes by the enterprise funds. Revenues are recognized in the accounting period in which they are earned, and expenses are recognized at the time they are incurred.

Equity in Pooled Cash and Investments

To improve cash management, all cash received by the Bureau is pooled in a central bank account. Monies for all funds are maintained in this account or temporarily used to purchase short-term investments. Individual fund integrity is maintained through Bureau records. Each fund's interest in the pool is presented as "Equity in Pooled Cash and Cash Equivalents" on the balance sheet. Investments are stated at cost or amortized cost. Investment earnings are allocated based upon Bureau policy.

For purposes of the statement of cash flows and for presentation on the balance sheet, investments of the cash management pool and investments with an original maturity of three months or less at the time they are purchased by the Bureau are considered to be cash equivalents.

Prepaid Items

Payments made to vendors for services that will benefit periods beyond December 31, 2001, are recorded as prepaid items using the consumption method. A current asset for the prepaid amount is recorded at the time of the purchase and an expenditure/expense is reported in the year in which services are consumed.

Fixed Assets and Depreciation

Fixed assets utilized in the enterprise funds are capitalized in the fund. All fixed assets are capitalized at cost (or estimated historical cost) and updated for additions and retirements during the year. Donated fixed assets are recorded at their fair market value as of the date received. The Bureau maintains a capitalization threshold of one thousand dollars. The Bureau does not have any infrastructure.

The costs of normal maintenance and repairs that do not add to the value of the assets or materiality extend an asset's life are not capitalized. Improvements are capitalized. Improvements to enterprise fund fixed assets are depreciated using the straight-line method over the remaining useful life of three to ten years.

Funds Held for Other Agencies

In 2001, the Bureau adopted Statement of Financial Accounting Standard No. 136, "*Transfers of Assets to a Not-for-Profit Organization or Charitable Trust that Raises or Holds Contributions for Others*" (FAS 136). This statement established standards for transactions in which the Bureau accepts a contribution from a donor and agrees to use those assets on behalf of or transfer those, the return on investment of those assets or both, to an unaffiliated entity that is specified by the donor. FAS 136 specifically requires that if the donor is a not-for-profit organization that establishes a fund at the Bureau using its own funds and for its own benefit, the Bureau must account for the transfer of such assets as a liability. The Bureau refers to these as Funds Held for Other Agencies.

The Bureau maintains variance power and legal ownership of agency funds and as such continues to report the funds as assets of the Bureau. However, in accordance with FAS 136, a liability has been established for the fair value of the funds, which is generally equivalent to the present value of future payments expected to be made to another entity.

As of December 31, 2001 and 2000, the Bureau was the owner of agency funds with a combined value of \$7,738 and \$3,265, respectively. All 2001 and 2000 financial activity related to those funds are recorded as adjustments to the funds held for agencies liability and are omitted from the statement of activities. The Bureau has disclosed the agency funds activities in Note I "Transactions in Funds Held for Other Agencies."

Revenue Recognition Policy

The Bureau recognizes tax revenues on the date which the hotels and motels receive the tax dollars. Special events revenues are recognized on the date at which the event has occurred.

Compensated Absences

Compensated absences cannot be reasonably estimated; therefore, the Bureau has taken the practice of not accruing such expenses.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions. Those estimates and assumptions affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

C. Deposits and Investments

State statutes classify monies held by the Bureau into three categories.

Active deposits are public deposits necessary to meet current demands on the treasury. Such monies must be maintained either as cash in the Bureau Treasury, in commercial accounts payable or withdrawable on demand, including negotiable order of withdrawal (NOW) accounts, or in money market deposit accounts.

Inactive deposits are public deposits that the Bureau has identified as not required for use within the current two-year period of designation of depositories. Inactive deposits must either be evidenced by certificates of deposit maturing not later than the end of the current period of designation of depositories, or by savings or deposit accounts including, but not limited to, passbook accounts.

Interim deposits are those monies which are not needed for immediate use but which will be needed before the end of the current period of designation of depositories. Interim deposits must be evidenced by time certificates of deposit maturing not more than one-year from the date of deposit or by savings or deposit accounts, including passbook accounts.

Protection of the Bureau's deposits is provided by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC), by eligible securities pledged by the financial institution as security for repayment, by surety company bonds deposited with the Treasurer by the financial institution, or by a single collateral pool established by the financial institution to secure the repayment of all public monies deposited with the institution.

At fiscal year end, the Bureau had \$50 in undeposited cash on hand, which is included on the balance sheet of the Bureau as part of "Equity in Pooled Cash and Cash Equivalents".

The following information classifies deposits by categories of risk as defined in GASB Statement No. 3, "Deposits with Financial Institutions, Investments, and Reverse Repurchase Agreements". The Bureau had no investments as of December 31, 2001 and 2000.

The carrying amount of cash at December 31, 2001 and 2000 was \$43,309 and \$37,477, respectively. The FDIC insures all deposits for 2001 and 2000.

The classification of cash and cash equivalents on the combined financial statements is based on criteria set forth in GASB Statement No. 9, "Reporting Cash Flows of Proprietary and Nonexpendable Trust Funds and Governmental Entities That Use Proprietary Fund Accounting".

E. Defined Benefit Pension Plan

All employees are covered by Social Security. The Bureau's liability is 6.2 percent of wages paid.

F. Defined Contribution Pension Plan

The Bureau, through the Chamber, has a qualified profit-sharing plan for which full-time employees are eligible after one year of service provided that they are twenty-one years of age or older. The plan allows eligible employees to defer up to 15% of their compensation in accordance with the Internal Revenue Code Section 401(k). The Bureau contributes 3% of an employee's compensation to the plan and matches up to 4% of the employee's deferral. Profit sharing expense for 2001 and 2000 was \$1,871 and \$65, respectively.

G. Contingent Liabilities

There are currently no matters in litigation with the Bureau as defendant.

H. Hotel/Motel Tax

The Bureau receives 40 percent of the hotel/motel taxes collected by the Hancock County Auditor. The tax, levied by the County Commissioners on December 22, 1988, is an excise tax of three percent on lodging furnished to transient guests throughout the County. Beginning in October 1, 2001, the Bureau began receiving 100 percent of the hotel/motel taxes collected by the Auditor.

I. Risk Management

J. Related Parties

Five members of the Chamber's Board of Directors operate and/or manage local businesses that the Bureau dealt with during the normal course of business. For the years ended December 31, 2001 and 2000, the amounts of these business services charged to operating expenses are \$624 and \$3,479, respectively. REPORT ON COMPLIANCE AND ON INTERNAL CONTROL OVER FINANCIAL

We have audited the financial statements of Convention and Visitors' Bureau, Hancock County (a nonprofit organization) as of and for the years ended December 31, 2001 and 2000, and have issued our report thereon dated April 3, 2002. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

Compliance

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the Convention and Visitors' Bureau's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grants, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance that are required to be reported under Government Auditing Standards. However, we noted certain immaterial instances of noncompliance, which we have reported to management of Convention and Visitors' Bureau in a separate letter dated April 3, 2002.

Internal Control over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit, we considered Convention and Visitor's Bureau, Hancock County's internal control over financial reporting in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements and not to provide assurance on the internal control over financial reporting. Our consideration of the internal control over financial reporting would not necessarily disclose all matters in the internal control over financial reporting that might be material weaknesses. A material weakness is a condition in which the design or operation of one or more of the internal control components does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that misstatements in amounts that would be material in relation to the financial statements being audited may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions. We noted no matters involving the internal control over financial reporting and its operation that we consider to be material weaknesses.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of the audit committee, management, others within the organization and federal awarding agencies and pass-through entities and is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than these specified parties.
