To the Board of Directors:

We have audited the accompanying basic financial statements of Zenith Academy, Franklin County, Ohio (the Academy) as of June 30, 2008, as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Academy's management. Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in the Comptroller General of the United States' *Government Auditing Standards*. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to reasonably assure whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of Zenith Academy, Franklin County, Ohio, as of June 30, 2008, and the respective changes in financial position and cash flows for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated March 11, 2009, on our consideration of the Academy's internal control over financial reporting and our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements and other matters. While we did not opine on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance, that report describes the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*. You should read it in conjunction with this report in assessing the results of our audit.

Management's Discussion and Analysis is not a required part of the basic financial statements but is supplementary information accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires. We have applied certain limited procedures, consisting principally of inquiries of management regarding the methods of measuring and presenting the required supplementary information. However, we did not audit the information and express no opinion on it.

Management's Discussion and Analysis For the Fiscal Year Ended June 30, 2008 (Unaudited)

The discussion and analysis of Zenith Academy's (the Academy) financial performance provides an overall review of the financial activities for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2008. The intent of this discussion and analysis is to look at the Academy's financial performance as a whole; readers should also review the notes to the basic financial statements and financial statements to enhance their understanding of the Academy's financial performance.

Financial Highlights

Key highlights for 2008 are as follows:

Net assets decreased \$78,869.

Total assets increased \$58,581 or 5.6 percent, due primarily to \$215,497 increase in capital assets. The increase was offset by \$191,764 decrease in intergovernmental receivables.

Total liabilities increased \$146,569, due to increases in accrued wages and benefits and intergovernmental payables.

The Academy had operating revenues of \$2,642,043, operating expenses of \$3,489,828, and non-operating revenues, consisting of federal and state grants, of \$768,916.

Using this Annual Financial Report

This annual report consist a series of financial statements and notes to those statements. These statements are organized so the reader can understand the Academy's financial position. The Statement of Net Assets and Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Change in Net Assets provide information about the activities of the Academy, including all short-term and long-term financial resources and obligations.

Statement of Net Assets, Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Change in Net Assets and the Statement of Cash Flows

These documents look at all financial transactions and ask the question, "How did we do financially?" The Statement of Net Assets and the Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Change in Net Assets answer this question. These statements include all assets, liabilities, revenues and expenses using the accrual basis of accounting similar to the accounting used by most private-sector companies. This basis of accounting considers all of the current year's revenues and expenses regardless of when cash is received or paid.

These two statements report the Academy's net assets and change in those assets. This change in net assets is important because it tells the reader that, for the Academy as a whole, the financial position of the Academy has improved or diminished. The causes of this change may be the result of many factors, some financial, some not. These statements can be found on Pages 7 and 8 of this report.

The Statement of Cash Flows provides information about how the Academy finances and meets the cash flow needs of its operations. The Statement of Cash Flows can be found on Page 9 of this report.

The Academy reports its operations using enterprise fund accounting, all financial transactions and accounts are reported as one activity; therefore, the entity-wide and the fund presentations information is the same.

As previously mentioned, total assets increased \$58,581 or 5.6 percent, due to \$215,497 increase in capital assets. The increase in assets was offset by \$191,764 decrease in federal intergovernmental receivables.

Total liabilities increased \$146,569, due to increases in accrued wages to Academy employees, and SERS and STRS benefits.

Cash and capital assets represented 96.1% of total assets. Capital assets are used to provide services to students and are not available for future spending.

Fiscal year 2008 was the Academy's third full year in operation. This led to increases in revenues in foundation revenues, and the increase in expenditures for employee salaries benefits, and purchased services.

Operating foundation revenues and non-operating federal and state grants represent over 99% of the total revenues of the Academy.

Employee salaries and benefits, and purchased service expenditures represent 91.9% of the total expenses.

Budgeting

The Academy is not required to follow the budgetary provisions set forth in Ohio Revised Code Chapter 5705.

Capital Asset and Debt Administration

Capital Assets

At the end of fiscal year 2008, the Academy had \$732,254 invested in leasehold improvements, furniture and equipment, and vehicles. Table 3 shows fiscal year 2008 balances compared to 2007:

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Notes to the Basic Financial Statements For the Fiscal Year Ended June 30, 2008

NOTE 1 - DESCRIPTION OF THE SCHOOL AND REPORTING ENTITY

Zenith Academy (the Academy) is a nonprofit corporation established pursuant to Ohio Revised Code Chapters 3314 and 1702. The Academy is an approved tax-exempt organization under Section 501(C)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. Management is not aware of any course of action or series of events that have occurred that might adversely affect the Academy's tax-exempt status. The mission of the Academy is to provide an educational environment wherein students at the Academy will build a foundation of knowledge, will master core skills, and will develop a life-long love of learning that will empower them to fulfill their roles as citizens. The Academy will accomplish this mission by focusing on knowledge, civic values, and service. The Academy is part of the State's education program, is nonsectarian in its programs, admission policies, employment practices, and all other operations.

The Academy was originally approved for operation under a contract with the Lucas County Educational Resource Center of Toledo and began operations on April 1, 2005. On April 6, 2006, the Academy entered into a 5-year contract with The Educational Resource Consultants of Ohio (the Sponsor). The Sponsor is responsible for evaluating the performance of the Academy and has the authority to deny renewal of the contract at its expiration.

The Academy operates under the direction of a five-member Board of Directors. The Board is responsible for carrying out the provisions of the sponsor contract, which include, but are not limited to, state mandated provisions regarding student population, curriculum, academic goals, performance standards, admission standards, and qualifications of teachers.

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements of the Academy have been prepared in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) as applied to governmental units. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) is the accepted standard-setting body for establishing governmental accounting and financial reporting principles. The Academy also applies Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) statements and interpretations issued on or before November 30, 1989, provided they do not conflict with or contradict GASB pronouncements. The Academy has elected not to apply FASB statements issued after November 30, 1989. Following are the more significant of the Academy's accounting policies.

A. Basis of Presentation

The Academy's basic financial statements consist of a Statement of Net Assets; a Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Change in Net Assets; and a statement of cash flows.

The Academy uses a single enterprise presentation for its financial records. Enterprise reporting focuses on the determination of operating income, change in net assets, financial position, and cash flows.

B. Measurement Focus

The enterprise accounted for using a flow of economic resources measurement focus. All assets and liabilities associated with the operation of the Academy are included on the Statement of Net Assets. The Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Change in Net Assets presents increases (e.g. revenues) and decreases (e.g. expenses) in total net assets. The Statement of Cash Flows reflects how the Academy meet its cash flow needs.

C. Basis of Accounting

Basis of accounting determines when transactions are recognized in the financial records and reported on the financial statements. The Academy's financial statements are prepared using the accrual basis of accounting. Revenue resulting from exchange transactions, in which each party gives and receives essentially equal value, is recorded on the accrual basis when the exchange takes place. Revenue resulting from non-exchange transactions, in which the Academy receives value without directly giving equal value in return, such as grants and entitlements, are recognized in the period in which all eligibility requirements have been satisfied. Eligibility requirements include timing requirements, which specify the period when the resources are required to be used or the period when use is first permitted, matching requirements, in which the Academy must provide local resources to be used for a specified purpose; and expenditure requirements, in which the resources are provided to the Academy on a reimbursement basis. Expenses are recognized at the time they are incurred.

D. Budgetary Process

Unlike other public schools located in the State of Ohio, the Academy is not required to follow the budgetary provisions set forth in the Ohio Revised Code Chapter 5705, unless specifically provided in the contract between the Academy and its sponsor. The contract between the Academy and its Sponsor prescribes an annual budget requirement in addition to preparing a five-year forecast, which is updated on an annual basis.

E. Cash

Cash received by the Academy is reflected as "Cash" on the Statement of Net Assets. The Academy did not have any investments as of June 30, 2008.

F. Capital Assets and Depreciation

Capital assets are capitalized at cost (or estimated historical cost) and updated for additions and retirements during the year. Donated capital assets are recorded at their fair market values as of the date received. The Academy maintains a capitalization threshold of \$1,000 dollars. The costs of normal maintenance and repairs that do not add to the value of the asset or materially extend an asset's life are not capitalized. Improvements are capitalized. The Academy does not capitalize interest.

All capital assets are depreciated. Improvements are depreciated over the remaining useful lives of the related capital assets. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method over the following useful lives:

Leasehold Improvements 27 Years
Furniture and Equipment 5 Years
Vehicles 3-5 Years

G. Net Assets

Net assets represent the difference between assets and liabilities. Net assets invested in capital assets consist of capital assets, net of accumulated depreciation. Net assets are reported as restricted when there are limitations imposed on their use, either through the enabling legislation adopted by the Academy or through external restrictions imposed by creditors, grantors, or laws or regulations of other governments.

The Academy applies restricted resources first when an expense is incurred for purposes for which both restricted and unrestricted net assets are available. The Academy did not have any restricted net assets at June 30, 2008.

H. Operating Revenues and Expenses

Operating revenues are those revenues that are generated directly from the primary activity of the Academy. Operating expenses are necessary costs incurred to provide the service that is the primary activity of the Academy. All revenues and expenses not meeting this definition are reported as non-operating.

I. Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported in the financial statements and accompanying notes. Actual results may differ from those estimates.

NOTE 3 - NEW GASB PRONOUNCEMENTS

For 2008, the Academy has implemented Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statement No. 45, "Accounting and Financial Reporting by Employers for Postemployment Benefits Other Than Pensions", GASB No. 48, "Sales and Pledges of Receivables and Future Revenues and Intra-Entity Transfers of Assets and Future Revenues", and GASB No. 50, "Pension Disclosures".

GASB Statement No. 45 improves the relevance and usefulness of financial reporting by requiring systematic, accrual-basis measurement and recognition of OPEB costs over a period that approximates employees' years of service and providing information about actuarial accrued liabilities associated with OPEB and whether and to what extent progress is being made in funding the plan. An OPEB liability at transition was determined in accordance with this statement for both the SERS and STRS post-employment healthcare plans in the amount of \$5,691 and \$1,346, respectively, which are the same as the previously reported liabilities.

GASB Statement No. 48 addresses how to account for the exchange of an interest in expected cash flows from collecting specific receivables or specific future revenues for immediate cash payments. The statement established criteria used to determine whether the transaction should be recorded as revenue or as a liability (a sale or a collateralized borrowing). The implementation of this statement did not result in any change to the financial statements.

GASB Statement No. 50 requires employers contributing to defined pension plans to include the legal or contractual maximum contribution rates in the notes to the financial statements. The implementation of this statement did not result in any change to the financial statements.

NOTE 4 - DEPOSITS

Custodial credit risk for deposits is the risk that, in the event of bank failure, the Academy will not be able to recover deposits or collateral securities that are in the possession of an outside party. At June 30, 2008, \$284,546 of the Academy's bank balance of \$384,546 was exposed to custodial credit risk because it was uninsured and uncollateralized. Although all statutory requirements for the deposit of money had been followed, non-compliance with federal requirements could potentially subject the Academy to a successful claim by the FDIC.

The Academy does not have a deposit policy for custodial credit risk beyond the requirements of State statute. Ohio law requires that deposits be either insured or be protected by eligible securities pledged to and deposited either with the Academy or a qualified trustee by the financial institution as security for repayment, or by a collateral pool of eligible securities deposited with a qualified trustee and pledge to secure the repayment of all public monies deposited in the financial institution whose market value at all times shall be at lease one hundred five percent of the deposits being secured.

NOTE 5 - RECEIVABLES

At June 30, 2005, receivables consisted of intergovernmental receivables of \$43,150 from the Ohio Department of Education for the Nutrition Cluster. The receivables are expected to be collected in full within one year.

NOTE 7 - RISK MANAGEMENT

A. Property and Liability Insurance

The Academy is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; injuries to employees and natural disasters. During fiscal year 2008, the Academy contracted with Indiana Insurance Company for property and general liability insurance with a \$1,000,000 single occurrence limit, \$2,000,000 annual aggregate, and \$1,000 deductible.

Settled claims have not exceeded this commercial coverage in any of the past three years and there have been no significant reductions in insurance coverage from the prior year.

B. Workers' Compensation

The Academy pays the State Workers Compensation System a premium for employee injury coverage. The premium is calculated by multiplying the monthly total gross payroll by a factor determined by the State. The Academy owed \$15,452 for this premium on January through June 2008 wages. The liability is reflected in the Statement of Net Assets at June 30, 2008.

NOTE 8 - EMPLOYEE BENEFITS

The Academy provides health, drug, and dental insurance for all eligible employees through Medical Mutual and Guardian Dental Guard Preferred. The Academy pays 75% of the monthly premium and employees pay the remaining 25%. The Academy does not provide life insurance and accidental death and dismemberment insurance to employees.

NOTE 9 - DEFINED BENEFIT PENSION PLANS

A. School Employees Retirement System

Plan Description - The Academy contributes to the School Employees Retirement System of Ohio (SERS), a cost-sharing, multiple employer defined benefit pension plan. SERS provides retirement and disability benefits, annual cost-of-living adjustments, and death benefits to plan members and beneficiaries. Authority to establish and amend benefits is provided by Chapter 3309 of the Ohio Revised Code. SERS issues a publicly available, stand-alone financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information. That report may be obtained by writing to the School Employees Retirement System, 300 East Broad Street, Suite 100, Columbus, Ohio, 43215-3746.

Funding Policy - Plan members are required to contribute 10 percent of their annual covered salary and the Academy is required to contribute at an actuarially determined rate. The current rate for the Academy is 14 percent of annual covered payroll. A portion of the Academy's contribution is used to fund pension obligations with the remainder being used to fund health care benefits. For fiscal year 2008, 9.16 percent of annual covered salary was used to fund pension obligations. The contribution requirements of plan members and employers are established and may be amended by the SERS' Retirement Board up to statutory maximum amount of 10 percent for plan members and 14 percent for employers. Chapter 3309 of the Ohio Revised Code provides statutory authority for member and employer contributions. The Academy's required contributions for pension obligations to SERS for the fiscal years ended June 30, 2008, 2007, and 2006, were \$64,916, \$32,013, and \$34,814, respectively; 50 percent has been contributed for fiscal year 2008 and 100 percent for fiscal years 2007 and 2006. \$32,163 represents the unpaid contribution for fiscal year 2008.

B. State Teachers Retirement System

Plan Description - The Academy participates in the State Teachers Retirement System of Ohio (STRS Ohio), a cost-sharing, multiple employer public employee retirement system. STRS Ohio provides retirement and disability benefits to members and death and survivor benefits to beneficiaries. STRS Ohio issues a standalone financial report that may be obtained by writing to STRS Ohio, 275 East Broad Street, Columbus, Ohio 43215-3771, by calling (888) 227-7877, or by visiting the STRS Ohio web-site at www.strsoh.org.

New members have a choice of three retirement plans, a Defined Benefit (DB) Plan, a Defined Contribution (DC) Plan, and a Combined Plan. The DB Plan offers an annual retirement allowance based on final average salary times a percentage that varies based on years of service, or an allowance based on member's lifetime contributions and earned interest matched by STRS Ohio funds divided by an actuarially determined annuity factor. The DC Plan allows members to place all their member contributions and employer contributions equal to 10.5 percent of earned compensation into an investment account. Investment decisions are made by the member. A member is eligible to receive a retirement benefit at age 50 and termination of employment. The Combined Plan offers features of both the DC Plan and the DB Plan. In the Combined Plan, member contributions are invested by the member, and employer contributions are used to fund the defined benefit payment at a reduced level from the regular DB Plan. The DB portion of the Combined Plan payment is payable to a member on or after age 60: the DC portion of the account may be taken as a lump sum or converted to a lifetime monthly annuity at age 50. Benefits are established by Chapter 3307 of the Ohio Revised Code.

A DB or Combined Plan member with five or more years credited service who becomes disabled may qualify for a disability benefit. Eligible spouses and dependents of these active members who die before retirement may qualify for survivor benefits. Members in the DC Plan who become disabled are entitled only to their account balance. If a member dies before retirement benefits begin, the member's designated beneficiary is entitled to receive the member's account balance.

Notes to the Basic Financial Statements For the Fiscal Year Ended June 30, 2008

Funding Policy - For the fiscal year ended June 30, 2008, plan members were required to contribute 10 percent of their annual covered salaries. The Academy was required to contribute 14 percent; 13 percent was the portion used to fund pension obligations. For fiscal year 2007, the portion used to fund pension obligations was also 13 percent. Contribution rates are established by State Teachers Retirement Board, upon recommendations of its consulting actuary, not to exceed statutory maximum rates of 10 percent for members and 14 percent for employers. Chapter 3307 of the Ohio Revised Code provides statutory authority for member and employer contributions.

The Academy's required contributions for pension obligations to STRS Ohio for the fiscal years ended June 30, 2008, 2007, and 2006, were \$132,659, \$71,771, and \$18,462, respectively; 82 percent has been contributed for fiscal year 2008 and 100 percent for fiscal years 2007 and 2006. No contributions to the DC or Combined Plans for fiscal year 2008 were made by the Academy or by plan members. \$24,414 represents the unpaid contribution for fiscal year 2008.

C. Social Security System

Effective July 1, 1991, all employees not otherwise covered by the School Employees Retirement System or the State Teachers Retirement System have an option to choose Social Security or the School Employees Retirement System/State Teachers Retirement System. As of June 30, 2008, all members of the Board of Directors have elected Social Security. Board members contributed 6.2 percent of their wages, and the Academy also contributed an amount equal to 6.2 percent.

NOTE 10 - POSTEMPLOYMENT BENEFITS

A. School Employees Retirement System

Plan Description - The Academy participates in two cost-sharing multiple employer defined benefit OPEB plans administered by the School Employees Retirement System for non-certificated retirees and their beneficiaries, a Health Care Plan, and a Medicare Part B Plan. The Health Care Plan includes hospitalization and physicians' fees through several types of plans including HMO's, PPO's, and traditional indemnity plans as well as a prescription drug program. The Medicare Part B Plan reimburses Medicare Part B premiums paid by eligible retirees and beneficiaries up to a statutory limit. Benefit provisions and the obligations to contribute are established the System based on authority granted by State statute. The financial reports of both Plans are included in the SERS Comprehensive Annual Financial Report which is available by contacting SERS at 300 East Broad Street, Suite 100, Columbus, Ohio 43215-3746.

Funding Policy - State statute permits SERS to fund the health care benefits through employer contributions. Each year, after the allocation for statutorily required benefits, the Retirement Board allocates the remainder of the employer contribution of 14 percent of covered payroll to the Health Care Fund. The Health Care Fund was established and is administered in accordance with Internal Revenue Code Section 401h. For 2008, 4.18 percent of covered payroll was allocated to health care. In addition, employers pay a surcharge for employees earning less than an actuarially determined amount. For 2008, this amount was \$35,800.

Active employee members do not contribute to the Health Care Plan. Retirees and their beneficiaries are required to pay a health care premium that varies depending on the plan selected, the number of qualified years of service, Medicare eligibility, and retirement status.

The Academy's contributions for health care for the fiscal years ended June 30, 2008, 2007, and 2006, were \$38,543, \$10,357, and \$11,427, respectively; 44 percent has been contributed for fiscal year 2008 and 100 percent for fiscal years 2007 and 2006. \$21,465 represents the unpaid contribution for fiscal year 2008.

Notes to the Basic Financial Statements For the Fiscal Year Ended June 30, 2008

The Retirement Board, acting with advice of the actuary, allocates a portion of the employer contribution to the Medicare B Fund. For 2008, this actuarially required allocation was 0.66 percent of covered payroll. The Academy's contributions for Medicare Part B for the fiscal years ended June 30, 2008, 2007, and 2006, were \$4,747, \$1,635, and \$1,804, respectively; 51 percent has been contributed for fiscal year 2008 and 100 percent for fiscal years 2007 and 2006. \$2,317 represents the unpaid contribution for fiscal year 2008.

B. State Teachers Retirement System

Plan Description - The Academy contributes to the cost sharing multiple employer defined benefit Health Plan administered by the State Teachers Retirement System of Ohio (STRS Ohio) for eligible retirees who participated in the defined benefit or combined pension plans offered by STRS Ohio. Benefits include hospitalization, physicians' fees, prescription drugs, and reimbursement of monthly Medicare Part B premiums. The Plan is included in the report of STRS Ohio, which may be obtained by visiting www.strsoh.org, or by calling (888) 227-7877.

Funding Policy - Ohio law authorizes STRS Ohio to offer the Plan and gives the Retirement Board authority over how much, if any, of the health care costs will be absorbed by STRS Ohio. Active employee members do not contribute to the Plan. All benefit recipients pay a monthly premium. Under Ohio law, funding for postemployment health care may be deducted from employer contributions. For 2008, STRS Ohio allocated employer contributions equal to 1 percent of covered payroll to the Health Care Stabilization Fund. The Academy's contributions for health care for the fiscal years ended June 30, 2008, 2007, and 2006, were \$10,205, \$5,521, and \$1,420, respectively; 82 percent has been contributed for fiscal year 2008 and 100 percent for fiscal years 2007 and 2006. \$1,878 represents the unpaid contribution for fiscal year 2008.

NOTE 11 - BUILDING LEASE

The Academy leases its facilities from the Academy Kids Learning Center, Inc. under a five year lease agreement. This lease is effective August 1, 2005 and expires August 31, 2010. The monthly rent is based on the square footage of the facilities. The total amount paid during fiscal year 2008 was \$295,272.

NOTE 12 - RELATED PARTY LOAN

Prior to receiving funding from the Ohio Department of Education (ODE), the Academy's Executive Director personally loaned \$48,188, to cover general operating expenses. There was no specific loan agreement with a specified repayment schedule, and there was no interest charged. As of June 30, 2007, the Academy repaid the Executive Director \$44,068. The remaining liability amount of \$4,120 was repaid during fiscal year 2008.

NOTE 13 - TAX EXEMPT STATUS

The Academy is a nonprofit corporation established pursuant to Ohio Revised Code Chapters 3314 and 1702. The Academy was approved on July, 28, 2007 for tax exempt status under 501(C)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. Management is not aware of any course of action or series of events that have occurred that might adversely affect the Academy's nonprofit status.

NOTE 15 - SPONSOR CONTRACT

The Academy entered into a five-year contract commencing on April 6, 2006 and continuing through June 30, 2011 with The Educational Resource Consultants of Ohio (the Sponsor) for its establishment. Under the contract, the following terms were agreed upon:

- The Academy shall operate in substantial compliance with its "Educational Program", which contains the Academy's mission, educational philosophy, the ages and grades of students, the characteristics of the students the Academy is expected to attract, the Academy calendar, the academic goals and the method of measurement that will be used to determine progress toward those goals, graduation requirements, and the focus of the curriculum.
- > The Academy shall operate in substantial compliance with a "Financial Plan", which establishes an estimated school budget for each year and a total estimated per pupil expenditure amount for each such year.
- The Academy shall secure the services of a Chief Executive Officer, who shall be the chief operating officer of the school, with primary responsibility for day-to-day operations of the Academy, and a liaison between the Academy and Sponsor.

As part of the agreement, the Academy agreed to compensate the Sponsor three percent of all funds received by the Academy from funding provided by ODE, including state start-up grants, for the time, organization, oversight, fees and costs of the Sponsor in overseeing the Academy. Total contract payments of \$85,709 were paid related to the provision of this contract as of June 30, 2008.

NOTE 16 - CONTINGENCIES

A. Grants

The Academy received financial assistance from federal and state agencies in the form of grants. The disbursement of funds received under these programs generally requires compliance with terms and conditions specified in the grant agreements and are subject to audit by the grantor agencies. Any disallowed claims resulting from such audits could become a liability of the Academy. However, in the opinion of management, any such disallowed claims will not have a material adverse effect on the overall financial position of the Academy at June 30, 2008.

Notes to the Basic Financial Statements For the Fiscal Year Ended June 30, 2008

B. Full Time Equivalency

ODE conducts reviews of enrollment data and full-time equivalency (FTE) calculations made by the Academy. These reviews are conducted to ensure the Academy is reporting accurate student enrollment data to the State, upon which state foundation funding is calculated. The review for the year ended June 30, 2008 resulted in an underpayment of \$4,717.

NOTE 17 - SUBSEQUENT EVENT

In July 2008, and addendum to the building lease was signed for additional space, increasing the monthly rent to \$15,189. Another lease for additional space was entered into in December 2008, resulting in a total rent payment of \$24,573 per month.

We have audited the basic financial statements of Zenith Academy, Franklin County, Ohio, (the Academy) as of June 30, 2008, and have issued our report thereon dated March 11, 2009. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in the Comptroller General of the United States' *Government Auditing Standards*.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit, we considered the Academy's internal control over financial reporting as a basis for designing our audit procedures for expressing our opinion on the financial statements, but not to opine on the effectiveness of the Academy's internal control over financial reporting. Accordingly, we have not opined on the effectiveness of the Academy's internal control over financial reporting.

Our consideration of internal control over financial reporting was for the limited purpose described in the preceding paragraph and would not necessarily identify all deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting that might be significant deficiencies or material weaknesses. However, as discussed below, we identified certain deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting that we consider significant deficiencies.

A control deficiency exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in performing their assigned functions, to prevent or detect misstatements on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a control deficiency, or combination of control deficiencies, that adversely affects the Academy's ability to initiate, authorize, record, process, or report financial data reliably in accordance with its applicable accounting basis, such that there is more than a remote likelihood that the Academy's internal control will not prevent or detect a more-than-inconsequential financial statement misstatement.

We consider the following deficiencies described in the accompanying schedule of findings to be significant deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting: 2008-001 and 2008-002.

A material weakness is a significant deficiency, or combination of significant deficiencies resulting in more than a remote likelihood that the Academy's internal control will not prevent or detect a material financial statement misstatement.

Our consideration of the internal control over financial reporting was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and would not necessarily identify all deficiencies in the internal control that might be significant deficiencies and accordingly, would not necessarily disclose all significant deficiencies that are also material weaknesses. However, of the significant deficiencies described above, we believe findings 2008-001 and 2008-002 are also material weaknesses.

We also noted certain matters that we reported to the Academy's management in a separate letter dated March 11, 2009.

Compliance and Other Matters

As part of reasonably assuring whether the Academy's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we tested its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could directly and materially affect the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit and accordingly, we do not express an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed an instance of noncompliance or other matter we must report under *Government Auditing Standards* as item 2008-003.

We did note a certain noncompliance or other matter that we reported to the Academy's management in a separate letter dated March 11, 2009.

The Academy's responses to the findings identified in our audit are described in the accompanying schedule of findings. We did not audit the Academy's responses and, accordingly, we express no opinion on them.

We intend this report solely for the information and use of the audit committee, management, Board of Directors, the Community School's Sponsor, and federal awarding agencies and pass-through entities. We intend it for no one other than these specified parties.

A significant deficiency is a control deficiency, or combination of control deficiencies, that adversely affects the Academy's ability to administer a federal program such that there is more than a remote likelihood that the Academy's internal control will not prevent or detect more-than-inconsequential noncompliance with a federal program compliance requirement. We consider the deficiency in internal control over compliance described in the accompanying schedule of findings as finding: 2008-004.

A material weakness is significant deficiency, or combination of significant deficiencies, that result in more than a remote likelihood that the Academy's internal control will not prevent or detect material noncompliance with a federal program's compliance requirements. We did not consider the deficiency described in the accompanying schedule of findings to be a material weakness.

The Academy's response to the finding we identified is described in the accompanying schedule of findings. We did not audit the Academy's response and, accordingly, we express no opinion on it.

FINDING NUMBER 2008-001

Significant Deficiency/Material Weakness

Financial Statements

Sound financial reporting is the responsibility of the Treasurer and the Board and is essential to ensure the information provided to the readers of the financial statements is complete and accurate.

The Academy made 4 audit adjustments to the June 30, 2008 financial statements as follows:

- Capital assets were understated \$56,750,
- Depreciation expense was understated \$3,561,
- Accrued wages and benefits was understated \$58,646, and
- Intergovernmental payable was understated \$90,932.

Not presenting financial information accurately resulted in the financial statements requiring the above audit adjustment entries, including additional time and effort to identify the variances and discrepancies.

We recommend the Academy's Treasurer take steps to ensure the accurate presentation of the financial statements. Financial transactions should be posted in accordance with procedures established by generally accepted account principles (GAAP). By exercising accuracy in recording financial activity, the Academy can reduce posting errors and increase the reliability of the financial data throughout the year and at year end.

The Academy's financial statements and capital asset records have been adjusted to accurately reflect these adjustments.

The Treasurer should review the audit adjustments and reclassifications identified above to ensure that similar errors are not reported in subsequent years. In addition, the Academy should adopt policies and procedures, including a final review of the financial statements, including the notes and management's discussion and analysis by the Treasurer to identify and correct errors and omissions.

Officials' Response:

Steps will be taken to ensure the accurate presentation of the financial statements, including increased collaboration and review.

Significant Deficiency/Material Weakness

Capital Assets

The capital assets list should be updated for any additions, disposals, and depreciation. An appropriate asset tracking or management system allows the Academy to properly report the value of its capital assets in the financial statements including accounting for and reporting depreciation of its assets. It also helps in reflecting dollar value of assets for insurance coverage, proof of loss, and replacement of assets.

As noted in Finding Number 2008-001, an audit adjustment of \$56,750 was proposed to reflect additional assets found during testing, and an audit adjustment of \$3,561 was proposed to reflect depreciation expense on those assets.

The lack of properly updating the system could allow for missing or unreported equipment and increases the risk of fraud. Additionally, these deficiencies resulted in inaccurate financial reporting of the Academy's capital assets, including depreciation, and could hinder the prevention of loss or misappropriation of assets.

We recommend the Academy update its capital asset database for items purchased and disposed after the item has been purchased or disposed of.

Adjustments have been made to the capital asset records of the Academy.

Officials' Response:

Greater care will be taken in the future to ensure the all assets purchased have been accurately presented in the financial statements.

FINDING NUMBER 2008-003

Non-Compliance Finding

Non-Payroll Disbursements

In accordance with Attachment 11, Part 4 of the sponsor contract dated April 6, 2006, the Academy's Business Manager must complete a purchase order for all supplies and materials. In addition, the signature of one of the Board Members or the Executive Director is required on the purchase order.

Purchase orders were not completed for 42% of the expenditures tested that related to the purchase of materials and supplies. For these items, a Board Member or the Executive Director did not sign off on the purchase order approving the purchase.

The lack of an approved purchase order could result in the Academy being in violation of their sponsor contract and could result in overspending funds and negative cash fund balances.

In accordance with the Academy's contract with its Sponsor, we recommend that purchase orders are prepared for all purchases of supplies and materials, and that they be approved by the Executive Director or a Board Member.

Officials' Response:

A new policy is in place to issue purchase orders if the value exceeds \$1,000.

The instructions for Project Cash Request (PCR) forms provided by the Ohio Department of Education (ODE) indicate that amounts reported in the fiscal summary section (i.e., project cash received, total award expenditures, fund cash balances, etc.) as of the date of the request should trace to the amounts actually expended.

Seven Title 1 Project Cash Request (PCR) forms were submitted to ODE which did not agree to the Academy's records for amounts expended as follows:
