Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying cash basis financial statements of Ohio Construction Academy, Franklin County, Ohio (the Academy), as of and for the year ended June 30, 2015, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Academy's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for preparing and fairly presenting these financial statements in accordance with the cash accounting basis Note 2 describes. This responsibility includes determining that the cash accounting basis is acceptable for the circumstances. Management is also responsible for designing, implementing and maintaining internal control relevant to preparing and fairly presenting financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to opine on these financial statements based on our audit. We audited in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the financial audit standards in the Comptroller General of the United States' *Government Auditing Standards*. Those standards require us to plan and perform the audit to reasonably assure the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit requires obtaining evidence about financial statement amounts and disclosures. The procedures selected depend on our judgment, including assessing the risks of material financial statement misstatement, whether due to fraud or error. In assessing those risks, we consider internal control relevant to the Academy's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not to the extent needed to opine on the effectiveness of the Academy's internal control. Accordingly, we express no opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of management's accounting policies and the reasonableness of their significant accounting estimates, as well as our evaluation of the overall financial statement presentation.

We believe the audit evidence we obtained is sufficient and appropriate to support our audit opinion.

Opinion

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the cash financial position of Ohio Construction Academy, Franklin County, Ohio, as of June 30, 2015, and the change in cash financial position thereof for the year then ended in accordance with the accounting basis described in Note 2.

Accounting Basis

Ohio Administrative Code § 117-2-03(B) requires the Academy to prepare its annual financial report in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. We draw attention to Note 2 of the financial statements, which describes the basis applied to these statements. The financial statements are prepared on the cash basis of accounting, which is a basis other than generally accepted accounting principles. We did not modify our opinion regarding this matter.

Emphasis of Matter

As discussed in Note 3 to the financial statements, during fiscal year 2015, the Academy has elected to change its financial presentation to a cash basis comparable to the requirements of *Governmental Accounting Standards*. We did not modify our opinion regarding this matter.

As discussed in Note 14 to the financial statements, the Academy is experiencing certain financial difficulties in the operating fund. Management's plans in regard to this matter are also described in Note 14. The financial statements do not include any adjustments that might result from the outcome of this uncertainty. We did not modify our opinion regarding this matter.

Other Matters

Other Information

We applied no procedures to Management's Discussion & Analysis as listed in the table of contents. Accordingly, we express no opinion or any other assurance on it.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated February 22, 2017, on our consideration of the Academy's internal control over financial reporting and our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements and other matters. That report describes the scope of our internal control testing over financial reporting and compliance, and the results of that testing, and does not opine on internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the Academy's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS (UNAUDITED)

Management's Discussion and Analysis

The discussion and analysis of Ohio Construction Academy's (the Academy) financial performance provides an overall review of the financial activities for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2015. The intent of this discussion and analysis is to look at the Academy's financial performance as a whole; readers should also review the basic financial statements and the notes to the basic financial statements to enhance their understanding of the Academy's financial performance.

Financial Highlights

Key financial highlights for 2015 are as follows:

- Total net cash position was \$84,636 at June 30, 2015.
- Total assets were \$84,636 in fiscal year 2015.
- The Academy had operating receipts of \$343,110 and operating disbursements of \$289,500 for fiscal year 2015.
- Total change in net cash position for fiscal year 2015 was an increase of \$83,754, from a beginning balance of \$882 to a balance of \$84,636.

Using these Cash Basis Basic Financial Statements

This annual report consists of a series of financial statements and notes to those statements. These statements are organized so the reader can understand the Academy's financial activities. The statement of net position – cash basis and statement of receipts, disbursements and changes in net position – cash basis provide information about the activities of the Academy.

Reporting the Academy's Financial Activities

Statement of Net Position and the Statement of Receipts, Disbursements and Changes in Net Position – Cash Basis

These documents look at all financial transactions and ask the question, "How did the Academy do financially during 2015?" The statement of net position – cash basis and statement of receipts, disbursements and changes in net position – cash basis answer this question. These statements include only net position using the cash basis of accounting, which is a basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United State of America. This basis of accounting takes into account only the current year's receipts and disbursements if the cash is actually received or paid.

These two statements report the Academy's net position and changes in net position on a cash basis. This change in net position is important because it tells the reader that, for the Academy as a whole, the cash basis financial position of the Academy has improved or diminished. The causes of this change may be the result of many factors, some financial, some not. These statements can be found on pages 7 and 8 of this report.

The table below provides a summary of the Academy's net cash position for fiscal years 2015 and 2014.

Over time, net position can serve as a useful indicator of a government's financial position. Total net cash position of the Academy increased \$83,754. This unrestricted net cash position may be used for the Academy's ongoing operations.

MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS (UNAUDITED)

The increase in disbursements was primarily in the areas of salaries and other disbursements related to the increase in FTEs from the prior year. There were an additional 12 students in fiscal year 2015.

Capital Assets

The Academy does not record capital assets in the accompanying cash basis basic financial statements, but records payments for capital assets as cash disbursements.

Debt Administration

At June 30, 2015, Ohio Construction Academy had a loan payable to Associated Builders and Contractors. This loan was made to Ohio Construction Academy for operating funds in the prior year. Summit Academy Management became the management company for Ohio Construction Academy as of July 1, 2015. In the management agreement, it is stated that Summit Academy Management will continue to pay this loan according to the promissory note, on behalf of Ohio Construction Academy.

Current Financial Related Activities

Beginning July 1, 2015, management of the school was provided by Summit Academy Management. Per the management agreement, Summit Academy Management pays all expenses, while billing back to the Academy only up to the total revenue received each month. The Academy will not be responsible for paying back any expenses that are over and above the total of the revenue received by the school.

Summit Academy Management has completed grant applications for the school to obtain additional federal grants funding during the school year, as well as completing all requirements to participate in the National School Lunch Program beginning in the 2016-2017 school year.

There has also been a push to increase the enrollment of the school since Summit Academy Management began working with Ohio Construction Academy.

NOTES TO THE BASIC FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 2015

Note 1 - Description of the Academy

Ohio Construction Academy (the "Academy") is a nonprofit corporation established pursuant to Ohio Revised Code Chapters 1702 and 3314 to address the needs of students in ninth through the twelfth grade. The Academy is nonsectarian in its programs, admission policies, employment practices and all other operations. The Academy may sue and be sued, acquire facilities as needed, and contract for any services necessary for the operation for the Academy.

A reporting entity is comprised of the primary government, component units, and other organizations that are included to insure the financial statements are not misleading. The primary government of the Academy consists of all funds, departments, boards, and agencies that are not legally separate from the Academy. For Ohio Construction Academy, this includes general operations, food service, and student related activities of the Academy.

The Academy was authorized by Warren County Educational Service Center for three school years, from July 1, 2013, until June 30, 2015. Warren County ESC did not renew its contract with the school due to the school's underperformance in terms of student enrollment that caused severe financial challenges.

Ohio Construction Academy operated as a Drop Out Recovery School under the management of Associated Builders and Contractors (ABC) of Central Ohio. The mission of the Academy is to provide high school students an innovative educational opportunity that explores construction related careers through an excellent foundation in core academic instruction and rigorous hands-on construction related training. Our curriculum prepares graduates for direct entry into a professional apprenticeship program, college, and a career.

The Academy operates under the direction of a self-appointed, five-member Board of Directors. The Board of Directors is responsible for carrying our provisions of the contract which include, but are not limited to, State-mandated provisions regarding student populations, curriculum, academic goals, performance standards, admission standards, and qualifications of teachers.

The Academy is staffed by 3 employees who provide services to 38 students.

The Academy's management believes these financial statements present all activities for which the Academy is financially accountable.

Note 2 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

As discussed further in the Basis of Accounting section of this note, these financial statements are presented on a cash basis of accounting. The cash basis of accounting differs from accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP). Generally accepted accounting principles include all relevant Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) pronouncements, which have been applied to the extent they are applicable to the cash basis of accounting. Following are the more significant of the Academy's accounting policies.

Basis of Presentation

The Academy's basic financial statements consist of a statement of net position and a statement of receipts, disbursements and change in net position. The statement of net position presents the cash balance of the business-type activities of the Academy at fiscal year-end.

Note 2 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

The statement of receipts, disbursements and changes in net position compares disbursements with receipts for each function of the Academy's business-type activities. Disbursements are reported by function. A function is a group of related activities designed to accomplish a major service or regulatory program for which the Academy is responsible.

Basis of Accounting

The Academy's financial statements are prepared using the cash basis of accounting. Receipts are recorded in the Academy's financial records and reported in the financial statements when cash is received rather than when earned and disbursements are recorded when cash is paid rather than when a liability is incurred.

As a result of the use of this cash basis of accounting, certain assets and their related revenues (such as accounts receivable and revenue for billed or provided services not yet collected) and certain liabilities and their related expenses (such as accounts payable and expense for goods or services received but not yet paid, and accrued expense and liabilities) are not recorded in these financial statements.

Budgetary Process

Unlike traditional public schools, located in the State of Ohio, community schools are not required to follow budgetary provision set forth in Ohio Revised Code, Chapter 5705, unless specifically provided in the contract between the Academy and its Sponsor. The contract between the Academy and its Sponsor does not prescribe formal budgetary provisions; however, it does prescribe that the Academy's Administrator compare income and expense to actual figures on a regular basis and also prescribes that the board will review and compare expenses and income from reports prepared by the Academy's Treasurer on a monthly basis. Under Ohio Revised Code Section 5705.391, the Academy must prepare a five-year funding plan and submit it to the Ohio Superintendent of Public Instruction.

Cash

All monies received by the Academy are maintained in a demand deposit account. For internal accounting purposes, the Academy segregates its cash into separate funds.

Capital Assets

Acquisitions of property, plant and equipment are recorded as disbursements when paid. These items are not reflected as assets in the accompanying financial statements.

Inventory and Prepaid Items

The Academy reports disbursements for inventory and prepaid items when paid. These items are not reflected as assets in the accompanying financial statements.

Net Cash Position

Net cash position is reported as restricted when there are limitations imposed on their use either through the enabling legislation or through external restrictions imposed by creditors, grantors or laws or regulations of other governments.

Note 2 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

The Academy applies restricted resources first when an expense is incurred for purposes for which both restricted and unrestricted net position is available

Operating Receipts and Disbursements

Operating receipts are those receipts that are generated directly from the primary activity of the Academy. For the Academy, these receipts are primarily foundation payments. Operating disbursements are necessary costs incurred to provide the service that is the primary activity of the Academy. All receipts and disbursements not meeting this definition are reported as non-operating.

Intergovernmental Receipts

The Academy currently participates in the State Foundation Program. Receipts received from this program are recognized as operating receipts in the accounting period received.

Accumulated Leave

In certain circumstances, such as upon leaving employment or retirement, employees are entitled to cash payments for unused leave. Unpaid leave is not reflected as a liability under the Academy's cash basis of accounting.

Employer Contributions to Cost-Sharing Pension Plans

The Academy recognizes the disbursement for employer contributions to cost-sharing pension plans when they are paid. As described in Notes 7 and 8, the employer contributions include portions for pension benefits and for postretirement healthcare benefits.

Long-Term Obligations

The Academy's cash basis financial statements do not report liabilities for bonds or other long-term obligations. Proceeds of debt are reported when the cash is received and principal and interest payments are reported when paid.

Note 3 - Change in Basis of Accounting and Restatement of Net Position

Change in Basis of Accounting

For fiscal year 2015, the Academy ceased to report using generally accepted accounting principles and reported on the cash basis as described in Note 2.

Restatement of Net Position

The implementation of this change had the following effects on the Academy's net position as it was previously reported.

Note 4 - Accountability and Compliance

Accountability

For fiscal year 2015, the Academy has implemented GASB Statement No. 69 "Government Combinations and Disposals of Government Operations".

GASB Statement No. 69 establishes accounting and financial reporting standards related to government combinations and disposals of government operations. The implementation of GASB Statement No. 69 did not have an effect on the financial statements of the Academy.

Compliance

Ohio Administrative Code, Section 117-2-03 (B), requires the Academy to prepare its annual financial report in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. However, the Academy prepared its financial statements on a cash basis, which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. The accompanying financial statements omit assets, liabilities, net position/fund balances, and disclosures that, while material, cannot be determined at this time. The Academy can be fined and various other administrative remedies may be taken against the Academy.

Note 5 - Deposits

Based on the criteria described in GASB Statement No. 40, "Deposits and Investment Risk Disclosures", as of June 30, 2015, the carrying amount of the Academy's deposits totaled \$84,636 and the bank balance was \$93,709. Of the bank balance, \$93,709 was covered by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation and \$0 of the Academy's bank balance was exposed to custodial risk because it was uninsured.

Note 6 - Risk Management

The Academy is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; injuries to employees; and natural disasters. During fiscal year 2015, the Academy contracted with various companies for the following insurance coverage:

Settled claims did not exceed commercial coverage in the past two fiscal years and there has not been a significant reduction in coverage from the prior fiscal year.

Note 7 - Defined Benefit Pension Plans

Plan Description - School Employees Retirement System (SERS)

Plan Description – The Academy's non-teaching employees participate in SERS, a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan administered by SERS. SERS provides retirement, disability and survivor benefits, annual cost-of-living adjustments, and death benefits to plan members and beneficiaries. Authority to establish and amend benefits is provided by Ohio Revised Code Chapter 3309. SERS issues a publicly available, stand-alone financial report that includes financial statements, required supplementary information and detailed information about SERS' fiduciary net position. That report can be obtained by visiting the SERS website at www.ohsers.org under Employers/Audit Resources.

Annual retirement benefits are calculated based on final average salary multiplied by a percentage that varies based on year of service; 2.2 percent for the first thirty years of service and 2.5 percent for years of service credit over 30. Final average salary is the average of the highest three years of salary.

Note 7 - Defined Benefit Pension Plans (Continued)

One year after an effective benefit date, a benefit recipient is entitled to a three percent cost-of-living adjustment (COLA). This same COLA is added each year to the base benefit amount on the anniversary date of the benefit.

Funding Policy – Plan members are required to contribute 10 percent of their annual covered salary and the Academy is required to contribute 14 percent of annual covered payroll. The contribution requirements of plan members and employers are established and may be amended by the SERS' Retirement Board up to statutory maximum amounts of 10 percent for plan members and 14 percent for employers. The Retirement Board, acting with the advice of the actuary, allocates the employer contribution rate among four of the System's funds (Pension Trust Fund, Death Benefit Fund, Medicare B Fund, and Health Care Fund). For the fiscal year ended June 30, 2015, the allocation to pension, death benefits, and Medicare B was 13.18 percent. The remaining 0.82 percent of the 14 percent employer contribution rate was allocated to the Health Care Fund.

The Academy's contractually required contribution to SERS was \$2,746 for fiscal year 2015.

Plan Description - State Teachers Retirement System (STRS)

Plan Description – The Academy's licensed teachers and other faculty members participate in STRS Ohio, a cost-sharing multiple-employer public employee retirement system administered by STRS. STRS provides retirement and disability benefits to members and death and survivor benefits to beneficiaries. STRS issues a stand-alone financial report that includes financial statements, required supplementary information and detailed information about STRS' fiduciary net position. That report can be obtained by writing to STRS, 275 E. Broad St., Columbus, OH 43215-3771, by calling (888) 227-7877, or by visiting the STRS Web site at www.strsoh.org.

New members have a choice of three retirement plans; a Defined Benefit (DB) Plan, a Defined Contribution (DC) Plan and a Combined Plan. Benefits are established by Ohio Revised Code Chapter 3307. The DB plan offers an annual retirement allowance based on final average salary multiplied by a percentage that varies based on years of service. Effective August 1, 2015, the calculation will be 2.2 percent of final average salary for the five highest years of earnings multiplied by all years of service. With certain exceptions, the basic benefit is increased each year by two percent of the original base benefit. For members retiring August 1, 2013, or later, the first two percent is paid on the fifth anniversary of the retirement benefit. Members are eligible to retire at age 60 with five years of qualifying service credit, or age 55 with 25 years of service, or 30 years of service regardless of age. Age and service requirements for retirement will increase effective August 1, 2015, and will continue to increase periodically until they reach age 60 with 35 years of service or age 65 with five years of service on August 1, 2026.

The DC Plan allows members to place all their member contributions and 9.5 percent of the 14 percent employer contributions into an investment account. Investment allocation decisions are determined by the member. The remaining 4.5 percent of the 14 percent employer rate is allocated to the defined benefit unfunded liability. A member is eligible to receive a retirement benefit at age 50 and termination of employment. The member may elect to receive a lifetime monthly annuity or a lump sum withdrawal.

Note 7 - Defined Benefit Pension Plans (Continued)

The Combined Plan offers features of both the DB Plan and the DC Plan. In the Combined Plan, member contributions are allocated among investment choices by the member, and employer contributions are used to fund the defined benefit payment at a reduced level from the regular DB Plan. The defined benefit portion of the Combined Plan payment is payable to a member on or after age 60 with five years of services. The defined contribution portion of the account may be taken as a lump sum payment or converted to a lifetime monthly annuity at age 50.

New members who choose the DC plan or Combined Plan will have another opportunity to reselect a permanent plan during their fifth year of membership. Members may remain in the same plan or transfer to another STRS plan. The optional annuitization of a member's defined contribution account or the defined contribution portion of a member's Combined Plan account to a lifetime benefit results in STRS bearing the risk of investment gain or loss on the account. STRS has therefore included all three plan options as one defined benefit plan for GASB 68 reporting purposes.

A DB or Combined Plan member with five or more years of credited service who is determined to be disabled may qualify for a disability benefit. Eligible survivors of members who die before service retirement may qualify for monthly benefits. New members on or after July 1, 2013, must have at least ten years of qualifying service credit that apply for disability benefits. Members in the DC Plan who become disabled are entitled only to their account balance. If a member of the DC Plan dies before retirement benefits begin, the member's designated beneficiary is entitled to receive the member's account balance.

Funding Policy – Employer and member contribution rates are established by the State Teachers Retirement Board and limited by Chapter 3307 of the Ohio Revised Code. The statutory maximum employee contribution rate was increased one percent July 1, 2014, and will be increased one percent each year until it reaches 14 percent on July 1, 2016. For the fiscal year ended June 30, 2015, plan members were required to contribute 12 percent of their annual covered salary. The Sample Entity was required to contribute 14 percent; the entire 14 percent was the portion used to fund pension obligations. The fiscal year 2015 contribution rates were equal to the statutory maximum rates.

The Academy's contractually required contribution to STRS was \$7,843 for fiscal year 2015.

Note 8 - Postemployment Benefits

School Employees Retirement System

Health Care Plan Description - The Academy contributes to the SERS Health Care Fund, administered by SERS for non-certificated retirees and their beneficiaries. For GASB 45 purposes, this plan is considered a cost-sharing, multiple-employer, defined benefit other postemployment benefit (OPEB) plan. The Health Care Plan includes hospitalization and physicians' fees through several types of plans including HMO's, PPO's, Medicare Advantage, and traditional indemnity plans as well as a prescription drug program. The financial report of the Plan is included in the SERS Comprehensive Annual Financial Report which can be obtained on SERS' website at www.ohsers.org under Employers/Audit Resources.

Access to health care for retirees and beneficiaries is permitted in accordance with Section 3309 of the Ohio Revised Code. The Health Care Fund was established and is administered in accordance with Internal Revenue Code Section 105(e). SERS' Retirement Board reserves the right to change or discontinue any health plan or program. Health care is financed through a combination of employer contributions and retiree premiums, copays and deductibles on covered health care expenses, investment returns, and any funds received as a result of SERS' participation in Medicare programs. employee members do not contribute to the Health Care Plan. Retirees and their beneficiaries are required to pay a health care premium that varies depending on the plan selected, the number of qualified years of service, Medicare eligibility and retirement status.

Funding Policy - State statute permits SERS to fund the health care benefits through employer contributions. Each year, after the allocation for statutorily required basic benefits, the Retirement Board allocates the remainder of the employer contribution of 14 percent of covered payroll to the Health Care Fund. For fiscal year 2015, 0.82 percent of covered payroll was allocated to health care. In addition, employers pay a surcharge for employees earning less than an actuarially determined minimum compensation amount, pro-rated according to service credit earned. For fiscal year 2015, this amount was \$20,450. Statutes provide that no employer shall pay a health care surcharge greater than 2 percent of that employer's SERS-covered payroll; nor may SERS collect in aggregate more than 1.5 percent of the total statewide SERS-covered payroll for the health care surcharge. For fiscal year 2015, the Academy's surcharge obligation was \$554.52.

The Academy's contributions for health care for the fiscal years ended June 30, 2015 and 2014 were \$27 and \$44, respectively. The full amount has been contributed for fiscal years 2015 and 2014.

State Teachers Retirement System

Plan Description – The Academy participates in the cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit Health Plan administered by the State Teachers Retirement System of Ohio (STRS) for eligible retirees who participated in the defined benefit or combined pension plans offered by STRS. Ohio law authorizes STRS to offer this plan. Benefits include hospitalization, physicians' fees, prescription drugs and reimbursement of monthly Medicare Part B premiums. The Plan is included in the report of STRS which can be obtained by visiting www.strsoh.org or by calling (888) 227-7877.

Funding Policy – Ohio Revised Code Chapter 3307 authorizes STRS Ohio to offer the Plan and gives the Retirement Board authority over how much, if any, of the health care costs will be absorbed by STRS. Active employee members do not contribute to the Health Care Plan. All benefit recipients, for the most recent year, pay a monthly premium. Under Ohio law, funding for post-employment health care may be deducted from employer contributions. For fiscal year 2015, STRS did not allocate any employer contributions to post-employment health care. The Academy's contributions for health care for the fiscal years ended June 30, 2015 and 2014 were \$0 and \$434 respectively. The full amount has been contributed for fiscal years 2015 and 2014.

Note 9 - Purchased Services

The Sponsor for the Academy, during fiscal year 2015, was Warren County Educational Service Center. In accordance with the sponsorship contract between the Sponsor and the Academy and in accordance with Ohio Revised Code Section 3314.03, the Academy will pay a sponsorship fee to the Sponsor of an amount not to exceed three percent of the total State Foundation Program payments during the fiscal year for oversight and monitoring. The academy paid \$11,004 to the Sponsor during fiscal year 2015 for these services.

The Academy also paid \$22,100 for fiscal services during fiscal year 2015.

Note 10 - Leases

The Central Ohio Chapter, Associated Builders and Contractors, Inc. (ABC Company) provided space for the Academy at no cost during fiscal year 2015.

Note 11 - Loan Payable

Prior to receiving funding from the Ohio Department of Education (ODE), the Academy obtained a loan from ABC Company in the amount of \$50,000 in May, 2013 to cover general operating expenses. The loan agreement specified the principal balance, with interest rate of 3% per annum, shall be due and payable on or before March 31, 2015.

Per the signed promissory note signed in June 2015, the Academy and ABC agreed to extend the maturity date to July 1, 2016. Upon signing the management agreement with Summit Academy Management, the agreement was made to pay this loan payable with funds available at fiscal year-end 2015.

This loan was paid in full on September 10, 2015, paid by Summit Academy Management using Ohio Construction Academy's funds. This follows the agreement that was signed by both Summit Academy Management and the Academy, when Summit Academy Management became the management company.

Note 12 - Enrollment FTE

The Ohio Department of Education reviews enrollment data and full time equivalence (FTE) calculations made by the schools. These reviews ensure the schools are reporting accurate student enrollment data of the State, upon which state foundation funding is calculated. The results of the review could result in state funding being adjusted. The review for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2015 resulted in an overpayment of \$85,781.82.

Note 13 - Federal Tax-Exempt Status

The Academy is a nonprofit corporations that has been determined by the Internal Revenue Service to be exempt from federal income taxes as a public charity under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

Note 14 - Management Plan to Alleviate Deficit Net Position

For fiscal year end 2015, the Academy had a cash balance of \$84,636; however, there were outstanding payables in the amount of \$168,870. In an effort to improve the stability, both financially and academically, the Academy has contracted with Summit Academy Management to be the management company for the school. Per the agreement, Summit Academy Management will begin paying all expenses on behalf of the Academy, in turn invoicing the Academy for these expenses, as well as a fee for all services rendered to the Academy. The invoiced amounts will not exceed the amount of revenue that is received by the Academy, instead Summit Academy Management will utilize its cash reserves to ensure that the Academy's payables are satisfied as they become due, if necessary.

The management company is currently working to build the brand for the Academy, as well as increase the awareness in the Columbus area, with a possible relocation of the school in the future. Locating the school in a more visible setting, also along a local bus route, will allow for more convenient access to the target population of students.

Summit Academy Management is committed to the success of the Academy and will continue to take an active approach to increase enrollment.

The Treasurer monitors the financial activities of the Academy on a daily basis, as well as submits financial reports to the Board for approval at each Board meeting.

Note 15 – Subsequent Event

Beginning July 1, 2015, Summit Academy Management entered into an agreement to become the management company and the Ohio Department of Education became the sponsor for the Academy. Summit Academy Management repaid the loan back to ABC Company in September 2015 on the Academy's behalf. See Note 11.

To the Board of Directors:

We have audited in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States and the Comptroller General of the United States' *Government Auditing Standards*, the cash-basis financial statements of the Ohio Construction Academy, Franklin County, Ohio (the Academy) as of and for the year ended June 30, 2015, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Academy's basic financial statements and have issued our report thereon dated February 22, 2017, wherein we noted the Academy elected to change its financial presentation to a cash basis, uses a special purpose framework other than generally accepted accounting principles, and is experiencing certain financial difficulties.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

As part of our financial statement audit, we considered the Academy's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) to determine the audit procedures appropriate in the circumstances to the extent necessary to support our opinion on the financial statements, but not to the extent necessary to opine on the effectiveness of the Academy's internal control. Accordingly, we have not opined on it.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, when performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and timely correct misstatements. A material weakness is a deficiency, or combination of internal control deficiencies resulting in a reasonable possibility that internal control will not prevent or detect and timely correct a material misstatement of the Academy's financial statements. A significant deficiency is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all internal control deficiencies that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies. Given these limitations, we did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we consider material weaknesses. However, unidentified material weaknesses may exist.

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Required by Government Auditing Standards
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Compliance and Other Matters

As part of reasonably assuring whether the Academy's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we tested its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could directly and materially affect the determination of financial statement amounts. However, opining on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit and accordingly, we do not express an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed an instance of noncompliance or other matter we must report under *Government Auditing Standards* which is described in the accompanying schedule of findings as item 2015-001.

Academy's Response to Finding

The Academy's response to the finding identified in our audit is described in the accompanying schedule of findings. We did not audit the Academy's response and, accordingly, we express no opinion on it.

Purpose of this Report

This report only describes the scope of our internal control and compliance testing and our testing results, and does not opine on the effectiveness of the Academy's internal control or on compliance. This report is an integral part of an audit performed under *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the Academy's internal control and compliance. Accordingly, this communication is not suitable for any other purpose.

Filing of Financial Statements Noncompliance

Ohio Rev. Code §117.38 and Ohio Admin. Code §117-2-03(B) requires the Academy to prepare its annual financial report in accordance with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP).

For the year ended June 30, 2015, the Academy's financial statements and footnotes were prepared on the cash basis of accounting, which is a comprehensive accounting basis other than GAAP.

The accompanying financial statements and notes omit assets, deferred outflows of resources, liabilities, deferred inflows of resources, net position, and disclosures that, while material, cannot be determined at this time.

We recommend the Academy prepare its financial statements in accordance with GAAP.

Officials' Response:

At the August 14, 2014 board meeting for Ohio Construction Academy, the board passed Resolution 2014-41, approving the cash basis of accounting in lieu of GAAP basis for reporting.
