BASIC AUDIT REPORT

We have completed certain procedures in accordance with Ohio Rev. Code Section 117.01(G) to the accounting records and related documents of Tri-Community Ambulance District, Huron County, Ohio (the District) for the years ended December 31, 2022 and 2021.

Our procedures were designed solely to satisfy the audit requirements of Ohio Rev. Code Section 117.11(A). Because our procedures were not designed to opine on the District's financial statements, we did not follow *generally accepted auditing standards*. We do not provide any assurance on the District's financial statements, transactions or balances for the years ended December 31, 2022 and 2021.

The District's management is responsible for preparing and maintaining its accounting records and related documents. Our responsibility under Ohio Rev. Code Section 117.11(A) is to examine, analyze and inspect these records and documents.

Based on the results of our procedures, we found the following significant compliance or accounting issues to report.

Current Year Observation

The Trustees are paid on a per meeting basis, and they contribute to Ohio Public Employee Retirement System (OPERS). According to OPERS, officials paid on a per meeting basis are considered to be paid fees rather than earnable wages.

The District should contact OPERS to clarify the situation, request refunds if they are not eligible for benefits and consult with their legal counsel to determine if they are required to contribute to social security if these amounts are considered fees and not earnable wages. Failure to contribute to the appropriate retirement system could result in fines and penalties being levied against the District.

This matter will be referred to the Internal Revenue Service and Ohio Public Employees Retirement System.

Current Status of Matters Reported in our Prior Engagement

1. We inquired with the District's management and determined that the District did not have a public records policy during the engagement period as required by **Ohio Rev. Code § 149.43(E)(2)**.

Because the District did not have a public records policy during the engagement period, it therefore could not have displayed posters of said policy in all the branches of the District as required by **Ohio Rev. Code § 149.43(E)(2)**. It could also not have provided a copy of the policy to the proper custodian or records manager as also required by **Ohio Rev. Code § 149.43(E)(2)**.

This could result in records requests not being fulfilled in accordance with Ohio law.

The District shall establish a public records policy and may address the District's available records, the times when public records may be inspected, and the costs associated with records requests. The policy shall be included in policy manuals and the Public Records Act requires that the policy be displayed conspicuously in all branches of the District. In addition, the District shall have written evidence that the Public Records Policy was provided to the records custodian/manager.

Furthermore, pursuant to **Ohio Rev. Code § 109.43(E)**, the Ohio Attorney General has developed and provided to all public offices a model public records policy for responding to public records requests. The policy, which is available at https://www.ohioattorneygeneral.gov/Files/Government-Entities/Model-Public-Records-Policy.aspx, provides guidance to public offices in developing their own policies for responding to public records requests in compliance with the Public Records Act. Our basic audit procedures for the years ended December 31, 2022 and 2021 indicated this matter has not been corrected.

2. We noted the District does not have an adopted records retention schedule. It therefore cannot have a copy of said policy available to the public. Ohio Rev. Code § 149.43(B)(2) states, in part, a public office also "shall have available a copy of its current records retention schedule at a location readily available to the public." Failure to have and follow a records retention schedule could result in public records being disposed of prematurely. The District should implement procedures to provide the appropriate policy is approved to help avoid issues with public records requests.

The Ohio History Connection provides suggested records retention schedules to aid local governments in creating and adopting their own records retention schedule.
