The Northwest State Community College Foundation is responsible for compliance with these laws and regulations.

Independent Auditor's Report

Board of Directors Northwest State Community College Foundation Archbold, Ohio

We have audited the accompanying statement of financial position of Northwest State Community College Foundation (a nonprofit organization) as of June 30, 1999, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses, and cash flows for the year then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Organization's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As described in Note 6 to the financial statements, the Foundation changed from the cash basis of accounting, which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than generally accepted accounting principles to the accrual basis method of accounting, which is in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Northwest State Community College Foundation as of June 30, 1999 and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated October 18, 1999, on our consideration of The Foundation's internal control over financial reporting and our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grants.

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

NATURE OF ACTIVITIES - Northwest State Community College Foundation (the Organization) exists to provide financial assistance to the educational programs, services and facilities of Northwest State Community College. To that end, the Organization solicits inter vivos and testamentary gifts.

BASIS OF ACCOUNTING - The financial statements of Northwest State Community College Foundation have been prepared on the accrual basis and accordingly reflect all significant receivables, payables and other liabilities.

BASIS OF PRESENTATION - Financial statement presentation follows the recommendations of the Financial Accounting Standards Board in its Statement of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS) No. 117, Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Organizations. Under SFAS No. 117 the Organization is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets and permanently restricted net assets.

CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS - For purposes of the statement of cash flows, the Organization considers all unrestricted highly liquid investments with an initial maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents. Cash and cash equivalents for purposes of the statement of cash flows exclude donor restricted cash and cash equivalents.

DONATED SERVICE AND FACILITIES - The Organization has no employees or property (other than cash and investments). Substantially all clerical and management duties are presently performed by business office personnel who are employees of Northwest State Community College, utilizing equipment and facilities of Northwest State Community College.

For accounting purposes, the value of facilities is considered immaterial and it has not been recognized in the financial statements. However, the value of the services provided by college personnel in the amount of \$32,245 have been recognized in the statement of activities as supporting revenue and as "In-Kind" supporting expense as required by SFAS 116.

MANAGEMENT ESTIMATES - The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

RESTRICTED AND UNRESTRICTED REVENUE - Contributions received are recorded as increases in unrestricted, temporarily restricted, or permanently restricted net assets, depending on the existence and/or nature of any donor restrictions.

INCOME TAX STATUS - The Organization is a not-for-profit organization that the Internal Revenue Service has determined to be exempt from income taxes under Section 501(C)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

INVESTMENTS - Investments are comprised of bonds and are carried at fair market value. Unrealized gains and losses are included in the change in net assets in the accompanying statement of activities.

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

EXPENSE ALLOCATION - Directly identifiable expenses are charged to programs and supporting services. Expenses related to more than one function are charged to programs and supporting services on the basis of management estimates.

Administrative expenses include those expenses that are not directly identifiable with any other specific function but provide for the overall support and direction of the organization.

NOTE 4 - PLEDGES RECEIVABLE

As of June 30, 1999, the Foundation had received unconditional promises to give totaling \$153,008. The unconditional promises are a result of the Foundation's current fund raising campaign, in which the donor has the option of designating a specific field of study. Undesignated promises must be used for general needs. At June 30, 1999, the promises to give are recorded at the present value of future cash flows and are due as follows:

Permanently restricted net assets consist of endowment funds to be held indefinitely, income from which is to be used for scholarships. At June 30, 1999 endowments totaled \$329,461.

NOTE 6 - CHANGE IN ACCOUNTING PRINCIPLE

During the year ended June 30, 1999, the Foundation changed from the cash basis method of accounting, which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than generally accepted accounting principles to the accrual basis method of accounting, which is in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. Since the change in accounting principle was not material to these financial statements, no adjustment was made to the statement of activities for the prior year ended June 30, 1998.

NOTE 7 - YEAR 2000 ISSUE

The year 2000 issue is the result of shortcomings in many electronic data processing systems and other electronic equipment that may adversely affect the Foundations' operations as early as fiscal year 1999.

The Foundation has completed remediation of computer systems that may be affected by the year 2000 issue and that are necessary to conducting the Foundation's operations. Testing and validation of the systems will need to be completed. Management reasonably expects the systems to be year 2000 compliant.

Because of the unprecedented nature of the year 2000 issue, its effects and the success of related remediation efforts will not be fully determinable until the year 2000 and thereafter. Management cannot assure that the Foundation is or will be year 2000 ready, that the Foundation's remediation efforts will be successful in whole or in part or that parties with whom the Foundation does business will be year 2000 ready.

REPORT ON COMPLIANCE AND ON INTERNAL CONTROL OVER FINANCIAL REPORTING BASED ON AN AUDIT OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS PERFORMED IN ACCORDANCE WITH GOVERNMENT AUDITING STANDARDS

We have audited the financial statements of Northwest State Community College Foundation as of June 30, 1999, and have issued our report thereon dated October 18, 1999. We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

Compliance

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether The Foundation's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grants, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit, we considered the Foundation's internal control over financial reporting in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements and not to provide assurance on the internal control over financial reporting. Our consideration of the internal control over financial reporting would not necessarily disclose all matters in the internal control over financial reporting that might be material weaknesses. A material weakness is a condition in which the design or operation of one or more of the internal control components does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that misstatements in amounts that would be material in relation to the financial statements being audited may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions. We noted no matters involving the internal control over financial reporting and its operation that we consider to be material weaknesses. However, we noted other matters involving the internal control over financial reporting that we have reported to management of the Foundation in a separate letter dated October 18, 1999.

This report is intended for the information of the Board of Trustees and management and is note intended to be used and should not be used by anyone other than these specified parties.
