We have audited the accompanying statement of financial position of Lorain County Community College Foundation, Inc. (an Ohio non-profit organization) as of June 30, 2001 and the related statements of activities and cash flows for the year then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the organization's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. The financial statements include certain prior year summarized comparative information in total, but not by net asset class. Such information should be read in conjunction with the Organization's financial statements for the year ended June 30, 2000, from which the summarized information is derived. The financial statements for June 30, 2000 were previously audited by Mitchell Zunich & Company whose report dated September 29, 2000 expressed an unqualified opinion on those statements.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and the significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Lorain County Community College Foundation, Inc. as of June 30, 2001, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, we have also issued our report dated September 27, 2001, on our consideration of Lorain County Community College Foundation, Inc.'s internal control over financial reporting and our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grants. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with Government Auditing Standards and should be read in conjunction with this report in considering the results of our audit.

Notes to Financial Statements Year Ended June 30, 2001

NOTE A - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Nature of Activities

Lorain County Community College Foundation, Inc. (the Foundation), a Non-Governmental, Non-Profit corporation established under the laws of the State of Ohio, was established to foster excellence in teaching and learning by encouraging philanthropic support for students, faculty, programs, and facilities of Lorain County Community College (the College).

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Foundation have been prepared utilizing the accrual basis of accounting and accordingly reflect all significant receivables, payables and other liabilities. Furthermore, the accounting policies adhered to by the Foundation are generally consistent with the *Audit and Accounting Guide for Not-For-Profit Organizations* issued by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants.

Basis of Presentation

Financial statement presentation follows the recommendations of the Financial Accounting Standards Board in its Statement of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS) No. 117, *Financial Statements of Not-For-Profit Organizations*. Under SFAS No. 117, the Foundation is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets and permanently restricted net assets.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

The Foundation classifies its checking and money market accounts as cash. Any cash or cash equivalents maintained in any professional managed account is classified as investments, due to the overall non-current investment strategy of their investment philosophy.

Comparative Financial Information

The financial statements include certain prior year summarized comparative financial information. Such information does not include sufficient detail to constitute a full financial statement presentation. Accordingly, such information should be read in conjunction with the Foundation's financial statements for the year ended June 30, 2000, from which the summarized information was derived.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

Equipment

Equipment is recorded at historical cost or fair market value in case of donation. Depreciation is recorded on the straight-line method over the useful lives of the respective assets, which is generally five years. The Foundation capitalizes all long-lived assets with a useful life in excess of one year.

NOTE A - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Art Collection

The Foundation's art collection is valued at cost or fair market value, at the date of acquisition, in the case of donation. During the year ended June 30, 2001, the entire art collection was donated to the College.

Donated Services

Donated services are recognized as contributions in accordance with SFAS No. 116, *Accounting for Contributions Received and Contributions Made*, if the services (a) create or enhance nonfinancial assets or (b) require specialized skills, are performed by people with those skills, and would otherwise be purchased by the Foundation.

Unrestricted net assets

Net assets not subject to donor-imposed stipulations. This category includes net assets designated by the Board.

Temporarily Restricted Net Assets

Net assets subject to donor-imposed stipulations that may or will be met by actions of the Board/Organization and/or the passage of time.

Permanently Restricted Net Assets

Net assets subject to donor-imposed stipulations that they be maintained permanently by the Organization.

Administration Fee

The Foundation allocates a .9 percent administration fee on temporarily and permanently restricted net assets to provide for indirect program, management and general, and fundraising expenses. The total amount charged to net assets related to this fee was \$168,090 and \$142,938 for the years ended June 30, 2001 and 2000, respectively.

Functional Allocation of Expenses

The cost of providing various programs and supporting services have been summarized on a functional basis in the statement of activities. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among programs and supporting services benefited.

Reclassifications

Certain June 30, 2000 balances have been reclassified to conform with the June 30, 2001 presentation.

Notes to Financial Statements Year Ended June 30, 2001

NOTE B - TAXES

The Foundation is exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) as a Non-Governmental, Non-Profit entity of the Internal Revenue Code. The Foundation has also been classified as an entity that is not a private foundation within the meaning of Section 509(a) and qualifies for deductible contributions as provided in Section 170(b)(1)(A)(vi).

NOTE C - CHARITABLE REMAINDER UNITRUSTS

The Foundation was named co-beneficiary of three charitable remainder unitrusts. Despite the fact the trusts are irrevocably funded, no amounts have been recorded in the accompanying financial statements, as the naming and changing of the charities in each trust are revocable by the trustees.

NOTE D - INVESTMENTS

Investments consist of debt and equity securities and mutual funds. Investments are carried at fair value and are summarized as follows:

Permanently restricted net asset investment income available for expenditure is limited to 4.5 percent of the trailing three year average of the permanently restricted net asset balance, with any excess investment income added to permanently restricted net assets. The Foundation's intent is that the 4.5% spending policy and .9 percent administrative fee will result in long-term preservation of permanently restricted net asset corpus.

NOTE I - OPERATING LEASES

The Foundation leases a vehicle and equipment under operating leases expiring in various years through 2006.

NOTE J - CONCENTRATONS

The Foundation may, from time to time, maintain in cash accounts at financial institution, which exceed federal depository limits.

At June 30, 2001, one donor's promise represented approximately 50% of the unconditional promises to give balance.

NOTE K - RELATED PARTY

As described in Note A, the Foundation is affiliated with the College. During the year ended June 30, 2001, the College provided professional services valued at \$191,449 to the Foundation. The value of those services are included as contributions in the financial statement and expensed on a functional basis based on the type of service.

During the years ended June 30, 2001 and 2000, the Foundation incurred expenses of \$1,220,320 and \$2,335,974 for scholarships and support of the College.

At June 30, 2001 and 2000, amounts due to the College totaled \$1,470,468 and \$1,706,149, respectively.

(an Ohio nonprofit organization) as of and for the year ended June 30, 2001, and have issued our report dated September 27, 2001. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits obtained in Government Auditing Standards, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

Compliance

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether Lorain County Community College Foundation, Inc.'s financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grants, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance that are required to be reported under Government Auditing Standards.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit, we considered Lorain County Community College Foundation, Inc.'s internal control over financial reporting in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements and not to provide assurance on the internal control over financial reporting. Our consideration of the internal control over financial reporting would not necessarily disclose all matters in the internal control over financial reporting that might be material weaknesses. A material weakness is a condition in which the design or operation of one or more of the internal control components does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that misstatements in amounts that would be material in relation to the financial statements being audited may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions. We noted no matters involving the internal control over financial reporting and its operations that we consider to be material weaknesses.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of the board of trustees, management, and others within the organization and is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than these specified parties.
