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INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

To the Board of Trustees Steel Valley Regional Transit Authority Steubenville, Ohio

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the Steel Valley Regional Transit Authority (the "Authority") as of December 31, 2001 and 2000, and for the years then ended, as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of the management of the Authority. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audits.

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. 1. ORGANIZATION AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Organization – Steel Valley Regional Transit Authority ("SVRTA" or the "Authority") was created pursuant to Sections 306.30 through 306.71 of the Ohio Revised Code for the purpose of providing public transportation in the Steubenville – Mingo Junction area. The Authority commenced operations on January 1, 1996. As a political subdivision it is distinct from, and is not an agency of, the State of Ohio or any other local governmental unit. The Authority is not subject to federal or state income taxes.

The Authority is managed by a five-member Board of Trustees and provides virtually all mass transportation within the greater Steubenville – Mingo Junction area. In 2001, the Authority had fourteen full-time equivalent employees. Approximately 47% of the Authority's employees at December 31, 2001 are subject to a collective bargaining agreement. A new three year collective bargaining agreement expiring on December 31, 2004 was signed in January, 2002.

Reporting Entity – The Authority has adopted the provisions of Statement No. 14 of the Governmental Accounting Standards Board ("GASB") regarding the definition of the financial reporting entity. Accordingly, the accompanying financial statements include only the accounts and transactions of the Authority. Under the criteria specified in Statement No. 14, the Authority has no component units. The Authority is not financially accountable for any other organization.

Basis of Accounting – The Authority follows the accrual basis of accounting, whereby revenues and expenses are recognized in the period earned or incurred. The measurement focus is on determination of net income, financial position and cash flows. All transactions are accounted for in a single enterprise fund.

Pursuant to GASB Statement No. 20, *Accounting and Financial Reporting for Proprietary Funds and Other Governmental Entities that Use Proprietary Fund Accounting*, the Authority follows GASB guidance as applicable to proprietary funds and Financial Accounting Standards Board Statements and Interpretations, Accounting Principles Board Opinions, and Accounting Research Bulletins issued on or before November 30, 1989 that do not conflict with or contradict GASB pronouncements.

Cash Equivalents – For purposes of the statement of cash flows, the Authority considers all highly liquid investments (including restricted assets) with a maturity of three months or less when purchased to be cash equivalents.

Inventory – Inventory is stated at cost using the average cost method. Inventory consists of fuel in storage tanks for transportation equipment.

Property and Depreciation – Improvements and equipment are stated at historical cost. The costs of normal maintenance and repairs are charged to operations as incurred. Improvements are capitalized and depreciated over the remaining useful lives of the equipment.

Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the respective assets, as follows:

Depreciation recognized on assets acquired or constructed through grants externally restricted for capital acquisitions are closed to the appropriate contributed capital account. Net income adjusted by the amount of depreciation on fixed assets acquired in this manner is closed to retained earnings.

Restricted Assets – Restricted assets consist of monies and other resources, the use of which is restricted for specific activities.

Recognition of Revenue, Receivables and Deferred Revenues – Passenger fares and charter fees are recorded as revenue at the time services are performed.

Non-exchange transactions, in which the Authority receives value without directly giving equal value in return, include property taxes, grants, and entitlements. On an accrual basis, revenue from property taxes is recognized in the period for which the levy is intended to finance, which is the year after the taxes are levied. Taxes levied in 2001 that will be collected in 2002 are recorded as receivable and deferred revenue. Deferred revenue arises when assets are recognized before revenue recognition criteria have been satisfied. Revenue from grants and entitlements is recognized in the fiscal year in which all eligibility requirements have been satisfied. Eligibility requirements include timing requirements, which specify the year when the resources are required to be used or the fiscal year when use is first permitted, matching requirements, in which the Authority must provide local resources to be used for a specified purpose, and expenditure requirements, in which the resources are provided to the Authority on a reimbursement basis.

Vacation and Sick Pay Benefits – Employees earned vacation and sick pay benefits each year based upon length of service and employment status. Employees may not carry any vacation days over into a subsequent year. No payments are made for vacation days that are unused at the end of the year. Employees can carryover unused sick leave to a maximum of 720 hours. Sick leave is nonvesting and no sick leave benefits have been accrued. Unused sick benefits lapse upon an employee's separation from the Authority.

Reclassifications – The Authority has reclassified certain amounts in the 2000 financial statements to conform to the current year's presentation.

Use of Estimates – The preparation of financial statements in conformity with GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Budgetary Accounting - The Authority's annual budget of revenues, expenses, and capital expenditures is prepared under the accrual basis of accounting, GAAP. The budget is adopted by resolution of the Board of Trustees. The Authority, operating as an enterprise fund, utilizes such budget and related budgetary accounting to ensure that: (1) service objectives are attained; (2) expenditures are properly controlled; and (3) adequate resources will be available to finance current operations and meet capital outlay requirements.

Because the Authority's revenues and expense may fluctuate with changing service delivery levels, a flexible-rather than fixed-dollar budget is utilized to permit budgetary revision based upon changing fare revenue, levels of service, and cost of operations at specific service levels. Actual results of operations are compared to the final, revised budget of the Authority for the year.

New Accounting Pronouncement – The Authority will implement the provisions of GASB Statement No. 34, *Basic Financial Statements Management Discussion and Analysis for State and Local Governments;* GASB Statements No. 37, *Basic Financial Statements and Managements Discussion and Analysis for State and Local Governments; Omnibus;* and GASB Statements No. 38, *Certain Financial Statement Note Disclosures,* effective for the year ended December 31, 2004. Management has not yet determined the impact of these statements on the Authority's financial statements.

2. CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS

The provisions of the Ohio Revised Code govern the investment and deposit of authority monies. In accordance with these statutes, only banks located in Ohio and domestic building and loan associations are eligible to hold public deposits. The statutes also permit the Authority to invest its monies in certificates of deposit, savings accounts, money market accounts, the State Treasurer's investment pool (Star Ohio), and obligations of the United States government and certain agencies thereof. The Authority may also enter into repurchase agreements with any eligible depository institution for a period not exceeding thirty days.

2. CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS (CONTINUED)

Public depositories must give security for all public funds on deposit. These institutions may either specifically collateralize individual accounts in excess of amounts insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC), or may pledge a pool of government securities valued at least 105% of the total value of public monies on deposit at the institution. Repurchase agreements must be secured by the specific government securities upon which the repurchase agreements are based. These securities must be obligations of or guaranteed by the United States Government and must mature or be redeemable within five years of the date of the related repurchase agreement. The market value of the securities subject to a repurchase agreement must exceed the value of the principal by two percent and be marked to market daily. State law does not require that security for public deposits and investments be held in the Authority's name.

The Authority is prohibited from investing in any financial instruments, contract, or obligation whose value or return is based upon or linked to another asset or index, or both, separate from the financial instruments, contracts, or obligation itself (commonly known as a "derivative"). The Authority is also prohibited from investing in reverse purchase agreements.

The Authority held no investments at December 31, 2001 and 2000.

Deposits – The carrying amount of the Authority's deposits was \$281,017 at December 31, 2001 with a \$300,050 bank balance. The deposits include a \$144,886 passbook savings account and \$136,131 in demand deposits. Of the bank balance, \$100,000 was covered by federal depository insurance and \$200,050 was uninsured and uncollaterized as defined by the *Governmental Accounting Standards Board*. The uncollateralized deposits were, however, covered by the financial institution's risk pool for public deposits as governed by the Ohio Revised Code Section 135.

3. PROPERTY TAXES

The Authority is subsidized by a property tax levy passed in May, 1995 for ten years by the voters of Steubenville and Mingo Junction, Ohio. Taxes of 1.0 mills are to be levied through 2004. Property tax revenue can be used for operating or capital purposes.

The Authority receives cash from tax levies when the related property tax collections are distributed by the Jefferson County Auditor's office. These distributions are generally received in the year following that for which the tax is levied.

4. DEFINED BENEFIT PENSION PLAN

Public Employees Retirement System of Ohio

Plan Description – All employees of the Authority are required to be members of the Public Employees Retirement System of Ohio ("PERS"), a cost-sharing, multiple-employer pension plan. PERS provides retirement and disability benefits, annual cost of living adjustments, and death benefits to plan members and beneficiaries. Chapter 145 of the Ohio Revised Code assigns the authority to establish and amend benefit provisions to the PERS Board of Trustees (Board). PERS issues a standalone financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information. The financial report may be obtained by making a written request to the Public Employees Retirement System of Ohio, 277 East Town Street, Columbus, Ohio 43215-4642 or by calling (614) 466-2085 or 1-800-222-PERS (7377).

Funding Policy – The Ohio Revised Code provides statutory authority for employee and employer contributions. Plan members are required to contribute 8.5% of their annual covered salary, and the Authority is required to contribute at an actuarially determined rate. The 2001, 2000, and 1999 employer contribution rate was 13.55%, 10.84%, and 13.55%, respectively, of annual covered payroll. The 2000 rate reflected a 20% temporary contribution rate rollback. The contribution requirements of plan members and the Authority are established and may be amended by the Board. The Authority's contributions to PERS for the years ending December 31, 2001, 2000, and 1999 were approximately \$44,900, \$33,000 and \$43,200, respectively, equal to 100% of the required contributions for each year.

Other Postemployment Benefits Provided Through PERS – In addition to the pension benefits described previously, PERS provides postretirement health care coverage to age and service retirees with 10 or more years of qualifying Ohio service credit. Health care coverage for disability recipients and primary survivor recipients is also available. The health care coverage provided by the retirement system is considered an Other Postemployment Benefit (OPEB) as described in GASB Statement No. 12. As required by state statute, a portion of each employer's contribution to PERS is set aside for the funding of postretirement health care. The Ohio Revised Code provides statutory authority for employer contributions. The contribution rates of 13.55% and 10.84% to the Plan for the years ended December 31, 2001 and 2000, respectively, included a portion (4.3%) that was used to fund healthcare. The portion of the Authority's contributions that were used to fund other postemployment benefits were approximately \$13,900 and \$13,100 for the years ended December 31, 2001 and 2000, respectively.

4. DEFINED BENEFIT PENSION PLAN (CONTINUED)

Summary of Assumptions:

- *Actuarial Review* The assumptions and calculations below were based on the System's latest Actuarial Review performed as of December 31, 2000.
- *Funding Method* An entry age normal actuarial cost method of valuation is used in determining the present value of OPEB. The difference between assumed and actual experience (actuarial gains and losses) becomes part of unfunded actuarial accrued liability.
- Assets Valuation Method All investments are carried at market value. For actuarial valuation purposes, a smoothed market approach is used. Under this approach assets are adjusted annually to reflect 25% of the unrealized market appreciation or depreciation on investment assets.
- *Investment Return* The investment assumption rate for 2000 was 7.75%.
- Active Employee Total Payroll An annual increase of 4.75% compounded annually, is the base portion of the individual pay increase assumption. This assumes no change in the number of active employees. Additionally, annual pay increases, over the above the 4.75% base increase, were assumed to range from 0.54% to 5.1%.
- *Health Care* Health care costs were assumed to increase 4.75% annually.

OPEB's are advanced funded on an actuarially determined basis. The number of active participating participants at December 31, 2001 was 411,076. \$11,735.9 million represents the actuarial value of the Retirement System's net assets available for OPEB at December 31, 2000 (the latest date information is available). The actuarially accrued liability and the unfunded actuarial accrued liability at December 31, 2000 (the latest date information is available), based on the actuarial cost method used, were \$14,364.6 million and \$2,628.7 million, respectively.

5. CONTINGENCIES

Federal and State Grants – Under the terms of the Authority's various grants, periodic audits are required where certain costs could be questioned as not being an eligible expenditure under the terms of the grant. At December 31, 2001, there were no significant questioned costs that had not been resolved with the applicable federal and state agencies. Questioned costs could still be identified during audits to be conducted in the future. Management of the Authority believes there will be no material adjustments to the grants and, accordingly, has not recorded a provision for possible repayments under the above grants.

The Authority receives a substantial amount of support from federal, state, and local governments. A significant reduction in the level of this support, if such were to occur, would have a material effect on the Authority's programs and activities.

7. RISK MANAGEMENT

The Authority is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts, theft of, damage to and destruction of assets, flood and earthquake, errors and omissions, employment matters, injuries to employees and employee theft and fraud.

The Authority participates in the Ohio Bureau of Workers' Compensation for workers compensation coverage and with the Ohio Department of Job and Family Services for unemployment coverage. The Authority continues to carry commercial insurance for all other risks of loss, including employee health, life and accident insurance. Settled claims resulting from these risks have not exceeded commercial insurance coverage in any of the past three years and there has been no significant reduction in insurance coverage in the year 2001.

8. ADOPTION OF NEW ACCOUNTING PRONOUNCEMENT

In fiscal year 2001, the Authority implemented the provisions of GASB Statement No. 33, *Accounting and Financial Reporting for Nonexchange Transactions*. This statement requires that capital contributions be recognized as revenues and not as contributed capital. Accordingly, during the year ended December 31, 2001, \$13,500 in capital contributions were recognized as revenue in the statement of revenues and expenses for the Authority.

1. BASIS OF PRESENTATION

We noted no matters involving the internal control over financial reporting and its operation that we consider to be material weaknesses.
