To the Governing Board:

We have audited the Balance Sheet of MODEL Community School, Lucas County (MODEL) as of June 30, 2002, and the related Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Retained Earnings, and the Statement of Cash Flows for the year ended June 30, 2002. These financial statements are the responsibility of MODEL's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. 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#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS JUNE 30, 2002

# 1. DESCRIPTION OF THE SCHOOL AND REPORTING ENTITY

MODEL Community School (MODEL) is a nonprofit corporation established pursuant to Ohio Revised Code Chapters 3314 and 1702. MODEL is an approved tax-exempt organization under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. Management is not aware of any course of action or series of events that have occurred that might adversely affect MODEL's tax-exempt status. MODEL's objective is to address the needs of students ages 5 to 11 who are diagnosed with autism or anything within the autism spectrum of disorders. MODEL, which is part of the State's education program, is independent of any school district and is nonsectarian in its programs, admission policies, employment practices, and all other operations. MODEL may acquire facilities as needed and contract for any services necessary for the operation of the school.

MODEL was approved for operation under a contract with the Lucas County Educational Service Center (the Sponsor) for a period of five years commencing August 26, 1998. The Sponsor is responsible for evaluating the performance of MODEL and has the authority to deny renewal of the contract at its expiration or terminate the contract prior to its expiration. The sponsorship agreement states the Treasurer of Lucas County Educational Service Center shall serve as the Chief Financial Officer of MODEL, (See Note 12).

MODEL operates under the direction of a nine-member Governing Board. The Governing Board is responsible for carrying out the provisions of the contract which include, but are not limited to, state-mandated provisions regarding student population, curriculum, academic goals, performance standards, admission standards, and qualifications of teachers. The Governing Board controls MODEL's one instructional/support facility staffed by 16 non-certified and 7 certificated full time teaching personnel who provide services to 28 students.

#### 2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements of MODEL have been prepared in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles as applied to a governmental nonprofit organization. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) is the accepted standard-setting body for establishing governmental accounting and financial reporting principles. MODEL also applies Financial Accounting Standards Board statements and interpretations issued on or before November 30, 1989, provided they do not conflict with or contradict GASB pronouncements. The more significant of MODEL's accounting policies are described below:

#### A. Basis of Presentation

*Enterprise Accounting* is used to account for operations that are financed and operated in a manner similar to private business enterprises where the intent is that the costs (expenses, including depreciation) of providing goods or services to the general public on a continuing basis be financed or recovered primarily through user charges or where it has been decided that periodic determination of revenues earned, expenses incurred, and/or net income is appropriate for capital maintenance, public policy, management control, accountability, or other purposes.

#### B. Measurement Focus and Basis of Accounting

The accounting and financial reporting treatment is determined by its measurement focus. Enterprise accounting uses a flow of economic resources measurement focus. With this measurement focus, all assets and all liabilities are included on the balance sheet. Equity (i.e.,

net total assets) is a part of retained earnings. Operating statements present increases (e.g., revenues) and decreases (e.g., expenses) in net total assets.

Basis of accounting refers to when revenues and expenses are recognized in the accounts and reported in the financial statements. Basis of accounting relates to the timing of the measurements made.

The accrual basis of accounting is used for reporting purposes. Revenues are recognized when they are earned, and expenses are recognized when they are incurred.

#### C. Budgetary Process

Unlike other public schools located in the State of Ohio, community schools are not required to follow budgetary provisions set forth in Ohio Revised Code Chapter 5705, unless specifically provided in MODEL's contract with its Sponsor. The contract between MODEL and its Sponsor does prescribe an annual budget requirement in addition to preparing a 5-year forecast which is to be updated on an annual basis.

#### D. Cash and Cash Equivalents

All monies received by MODEL are accounted for by MODEL's fiscal agent, the Lucas County Educational Service Center. All cash received by the fiscal agent is maintained in separate bank accounts in MODEL's name. Monies for MODEL are maintained in these accounts or temporarily used to purchase short-term investments.

For purposes of the statement of cash flows and for presentation on the balance sheet, investments with original maturities of three months or less at the time they are purchased by MODEL are considered to be cash equivalents.

#### E. Fixed Assets and Depreciation

Fixed assets are capitalized at cost and updated for additions and retirements during the year. Donated fixed assets are recorded at their fair market value as of the dates received. MODEL does not possess any infrastructure.

Improvements are capitalized. The costs of normal maintenance and repairs that do not add to the value of the asset or materially extend an asset's life are not capitalized.

Depreciation of furniture and equipment is computed using the straight-line method over an estimated useful life of five years. Improvements to fixed assets are depreciated over the remaining useful lives of the related fixed assets.

#### F. Intergovernmental Revenues

MODEL currently participates in the State Foundation Program, the State Disadvantaged Pupil Impact Aid (DPIA) Program, and the State Special Education Program. Revenues received from these programs are recognized as operating revenues in the accounting period in which all eligibility requirements have been met.

Grants and entitlements are recognized as non-operating revenues in the accounting period in which all eligibility requirements have been met.

## NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS JUNE 30, 2002 (Continued)

Eligibility requirements include timing requirements, which specify the year when the resources are required to be used or the fiscal year when use is first permitted, matching requirements, in which the School must provide local resources to be used for a specified purpose, and expenditure requirements, in which the resources are provided to the School on a reimbursement basis.

Amounts awarded under the above named programs for the 2002 school year totaled \$774,024.

# G. Prepaid Items

Payments made to vendors for services that will benefit periods beyond June 30, 2002, are recorded as prepaid items using the consumption method by recording a current asset for the prepaid amount and reflecting the expense in the year in which services are consumed.

# H. Security Deposit

MODEL entered into a lease for the use of a building for the operation of the school. Based on the lease agreement, a security deposit was required to be paid at the signing of the agreement. This amount is held by the lessor. In addition, MODEL paid additional temporary deposits for an event occurring in July at the Pinnacle in the amount of \$600 which ends July 11, 2003 and for storage space at Toledo Express Mini-Storage in the amount of \$200 which ends September 14, 2003. The deposits in the amount of \$5,965 are held by the vendors.

#### 3. DEPOSITS AND INVESTMENTS

The following information classifies deposits and investments by categories of risk as defined in GASB Statement No. 3, "Deposits with Financial Institutions, Investments (including Repurchase Agreements), and Reverse Repurchase Agreements".

At June 30, 2002, the carrying amount of MODEL's deposits was \$31,689, the bank balances were \$45,255. The bank balance was covered by federal depository insurance.

MODEL's investments are categorized to give an indication of the level of risk assumed by MODEL at fiscal year end. Category 1 includes investments that are insured or registered for which the securities are held by MODEL or its agent in MODEL's name. Category 2 includes uninsured and unregistered investments for which the securities are held by the counter-party's trust department or agent in MODEL's name. Category 3 includes uninsured and unregistered investments for which the securities are held by the counter-party, or by its trust department or agent but not in MODEL's name. MODEL's investments totaling \$23 (valued at cost), which are maintained in a Ready Resource Account (repurchase agreement) are included in Category 2.

# 4. RECEIVABLES

Receivables at June 30, 2002, consisted of accounts receivable and intergovernmental (e.g., federal and state grants) receivables. Accounts receivable consist of miscellaneous types of receipts and are collectible in full due to the unique nature of the receivables. All intergovernmental receivables are considered collectable in full, due to the stable condition of State programs, and the current year guarantee of federal funds.

#### 6. RISK MANAGEMENT

#### A. Property and Liability

MODEL is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; injuries to employees; and natural disasters. For fiscal year 2002, MODEL contracted with Nationwide Educational Insurers for property and general liability insurance.

Professional liability is protected by Nationwide Educational Insurers with a \$2,000,000 single occurrence limit and \$5,000,000 aggregate and no deductible.

#### B. Worker's Compensation

MODEL pays the State Worker's Compensation System a premium for employee injury coverage. The premium is calculated by multiplying the monthly total gross payroll by a factor that is calculated by the State.

#### 7. DEFINED BENEFIT PENSION PLANS

#### A. School Employees Retirement System

MODEL contributes to the School Employees Retirement System of Ohio (SERS), a costsharing multiple employer public employee retirement system administered by the School Employees Retirement Board. SERS provides retirement and disability benefits, annual costof-living adjustments, and death benefits to plan members and beneficiaries. Authority to establish and amend benefits is provided by Chapter 3309 of the Ohio Revised Code. SERS issues a publicly available financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information. The report may be obtained by writing to the School Employees Retirement System, 45 North Fourth Street, Columbus, Ohio 43215-3634.

Plan members are required to contribute 9 percent of their annual covered salary and MODEL is required to contribute at an actuarially determined rate. The current rate is 14 percent of annual covered payroll; for the year ended June 30, 2002, 5.46 percent was the portion to fund pension obligations. The contribution rates are not determined actuarially, but are established by SERS's Retirement Board within the rates allowed by State statute. The adequacy of the contribution rates is determined annually. MODEL's required contribution for pension obligations to SERS for the fiscal years ended June 30, 2002, 2001 and 2000, were \$13,686, \$9,642, and \$43,713, respectively; 63.18 percent has been contributed for 2002 and 100.00 percent has been contributed for fiscal years 2001 and 2000. The unpaid contribution for fiscal year 2002, in the amount of \$5,040 is recorded as a liability.

#### B. State Teachers Retirement System

MODEL contributes to the State Teachers Retirement System of Ohio (STRS), a cost-sharing, multiple-employer public employee retirement system administered by the State Teachers Retirement Board. STRS provides retirement benefits and disability benefits, annual cost of living adjustments, and death benefits to members and beneficiaries. Benefits are established by Chapter 3307 of the Ohio Revised Code. STRS issues a publicly available financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information. The report may be obtained by writing to the State Teachers Retirement System, 275 East Broad Street, Columbus, Ohio, 43215-3771.

Plan members are required to contribute 9.3 percent of their annual covered salary and MODEL is required to contribute 14 percent; 9.5 percent was the portion used to fund pension obligations for the year 2002. Contribution rates are established by STRS, upon recommendation of its consulting actuary, not to exceed statutory maximum rates of 10 percent for members and 14 percent for employers. MODEL's required contribution for pension obligations to STRS for the fiscal years ended June 30, 2002, 2001 and 2000 were \$26,861, \$22,025 and \$27,332, respectively; 99.76 percent has been contributed as of June 30, 2002 and 100.00 percent has been contributed for fiscal years 2001 and 2000. The unpaid contribution at June 30, 2002, in the amount of \$46, is recorded as a liability.

#### 8. **POSTEMPLOYMENT BENEFITS**

MODEL provides comprehensive health care benefits to retired teachers and their dependents through the State Teachers Retirement System (STRS) and to retired non-certificated employees and their dependents through the School Employees Retirement System (SERS). Benefits include hospitalization, physicians' fees, prescription drugs and reimbursement of monthly Medicare premiums. Benefit provisions and the obligation to contribute are established by the Systems based on authority granted by State statute. Both systems are on a pay-as-you-go basis.

The State Teachers Retirement Board has authority over how much, if any, of the health care costs will be absorbed by STRS. Most benefit recipients pay a portion of the health care cost in the form of a monthly premium. By law, the cost of the coverage paid from STRS funds shall be included in the employer contribution rate, currently 14 percent of covered payroll. For fiscal year 2002, the Board allocated employer contributions equal to 4.5 percent of covered payroll to the Health Care Reserve Fund. For MODEL, this amount equaled \$10,115.

STRS pays health care benefits from the Health Care Reserve Fund. The balance in the Fund was \$3.256 billion at June 30, 2001 (the latest information available). For the fiscal year ended June 30, 2001, net health care costs paid by STRS were \$300,772,000 and STRS has 102,132 eligible benefit recipients.

For SERS, coverage is made available to service retirees with ten or more years of qualifying service credit, and to disability and survivor benefit recipients. Members retiring on or after August 1, 1989, with less than twenty-five years of service credit, must pay a portion of their premium for health care. The portion is based on years of service up to a maximum of 75 percent of the premium.

For this fiscal year ended June 30, 2002, employer contributions to fund health care benefits were 8.54 percent of covered payroll. In addition, SERS levies a surcharge to fund health care benefits equal to 14 percent of the difference between a minimum pay and the member's pay, pro-rated for partial service credit. For fiscal year ended 2002, the minimum pay has been established at

\$12,400. For MODEL, the amount to fund health care benefits, including the surcharge, was \$28,759 for fiscal year 2002. The unpaid contribution for fiscal year 2002, in the amount of \$7,882 is recorded as a liability.

Health Care benefits are financed on a pay-as-you-go basis. The target level for the health care reserve is 150 percent of annual health care expenses. Expenses for health care at June 30, 2001 were \$161,439,934 and the target level was \$242.2 million. At June 30, 2001, the Retirement System's net assets available for payment of health care benefits as \$315.7 million. The number of benefit recipients currently receiving health care benefits is approximately 50,000.

# 9. OTHER EMPLOYEE BENEFITS

# A. Compensated Absences

The criteria for determining personal leave components are derived from policies and procedures approved by the Governing Board. Classified employees earn five days of personal leave per year. Personal leave is not accumulated. Unused personal leave is paid to classified employees upon termination of employment.

# B. Employee Medical, Dental and Vision Benefits

MODEL has contracted with a private carrier to provide employee medical, dental, and vision insurance to its full time employees who work 30 or more hours per week.

## 10. STATE SCHOOL FUNDING DECISION

On December 11, 2002, the Ohio Supreme Court issued its latest opinion regarding the State's school funding plan. The decision reaffirmed earlier decisions that Ohio's current school-funding plan is unconstitutional.

The Supreme Court relinquished jurisdiction over the case and directed "...the Ohio General Assembly to enact a school-funding scheme that is thorough and efficient...". The School District is currently unable to determine what effect, if any, this decision will have on its future State funding and its financial operations.

#### 11. CONTINGENCIES

#### A. Grants

MODEL received financial assistance from federal and state agencies in the form of grants. The disbursement of funds received under these programs generally requires compliance with terms and conditions specified in the grant agreements and is subject to audit by the grantor agencies. Any disallowed claims resulting from such audits could become a liability of the school. However, in the opinion of management, any such disallowed claims will not have a material adverse effect on the overall financial position of MODEL at June 30, 2002.

#### B. Administrative Complaint

A complaint was filed in the State of Ohio Department of Education Office for Exceptional Children in April of 2002, alleging MODEL was performing speech language therapy utilizing unlicensed, untrained, and unsupervised lay personnel to meet Individualized Education Plan objectives of speech therapy and only licensed speech language pathologists could render this

service. The complaint was dismissed on June 18, 2002, but is now being appealed to the Department of Education.

## C. Ohio Community School Program

A suit was filed in Franklin County Common Pleas Court, on May 14, 2002, alleging that Ohio's Community [i.e. Charter] Schools Program violates the state's Constitution and state laws. The effect of this suit, if any, on MODEL is not presently determinable.

# D. School Funding

The Ohio Department of Education conducts reviews of enrollment data and full-time equivalency (FTE) calculations made by the schools. These reviews are conducted to ensure the schools are reporting accurate student enrollment data to the State, upon which state foundation funding is calculated. The conclusions of this review resulted in state funding being adjusted. As a result of said review, the Academy's state foundation funding was increased by \$23,071 for fiscal year 2002, which is reported as an intergovernmental receivable at June 30, 2002.

# 12. FISCAL AGENT

The sponsorship agreement states the Treasurer of the Lucas County Educational Service Center shall serve as the Chief Financial Officer of MODEL Community School. As part of this agreement, MODEL shall compensate the Lucas County Educational Service Center two percent (2%) of the per pupil allotments paid to MODEL from the State of Ohio. The total contract payment of \$9,914 was paid during the year. MODEL owed the fiscal agent \$3,558 as of fiscal year 2002.

The Treasurer of the Sponsor shall perform all of the following functions while serving as the Chief Financial Officer of MODEL:

- a. Maintain custody of all funds received by MODEL in segregated accounts separate from the Sponsor's or any other Community School's funds;
- b. Maintain all books and accounts of all funds of MODEL;
- c. Maintain all financial records of all state funds of MODEL and follow State Auditor procedures for receiving and expending state funds;
- d. Assist MODEL in meeting all financial reporting requirements established by the Auditor of Ohio;
- e. For an additional fee of \$2,000 paid to the Sponsor quarterly in advance, (i) process all payroll checks and maintain all payroll, tax, pension and legally mandated accounts; (ii) comply with all unemployment compensation, worker's compensation and federal, state and local tax reporting and payment requirements;
- f. Invest funds of MODEL in the same manner as the funds of the sponsor are invested, but the Treasurer shall not commingle the funds with the Sponsor's or any other community school; and
- g. Pay obligations incurred by MODEL within a reasonable amount of time, not more than 14 calendar days after receipt of a properly executed voucher signed by the Chief Administrative

Officer of MODEL so long as the proposed expenditure is within the approved budget and funds are available.

MODEL has the option to renew the lease at an inflation-adjusted rate for one additional five-year term.

#### 15. PRIOR PERIOD ADJUSTMENT

On November 30, 1998, MODEL made a payment to TEM Enterprises, Inc. for a rent security deposit as a requirement of the lease of Arrowhead Commons. This payment was expensed in fiscal year 1999 instead of being recorded as an asset. The following is a summary of the change in retained earnings at June 30, 2001:

# Compliance

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether MODEL's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grants, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit and, accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*. However, we noted an immaterial instance of noncompliance that we have reported to management of MODEL in a separate letter dated March 27, 2003.

In planning and performing our audit, we considered MODEL's internal control over financial reporting in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements and not to provide assurance on the internal control over financial reporting.
