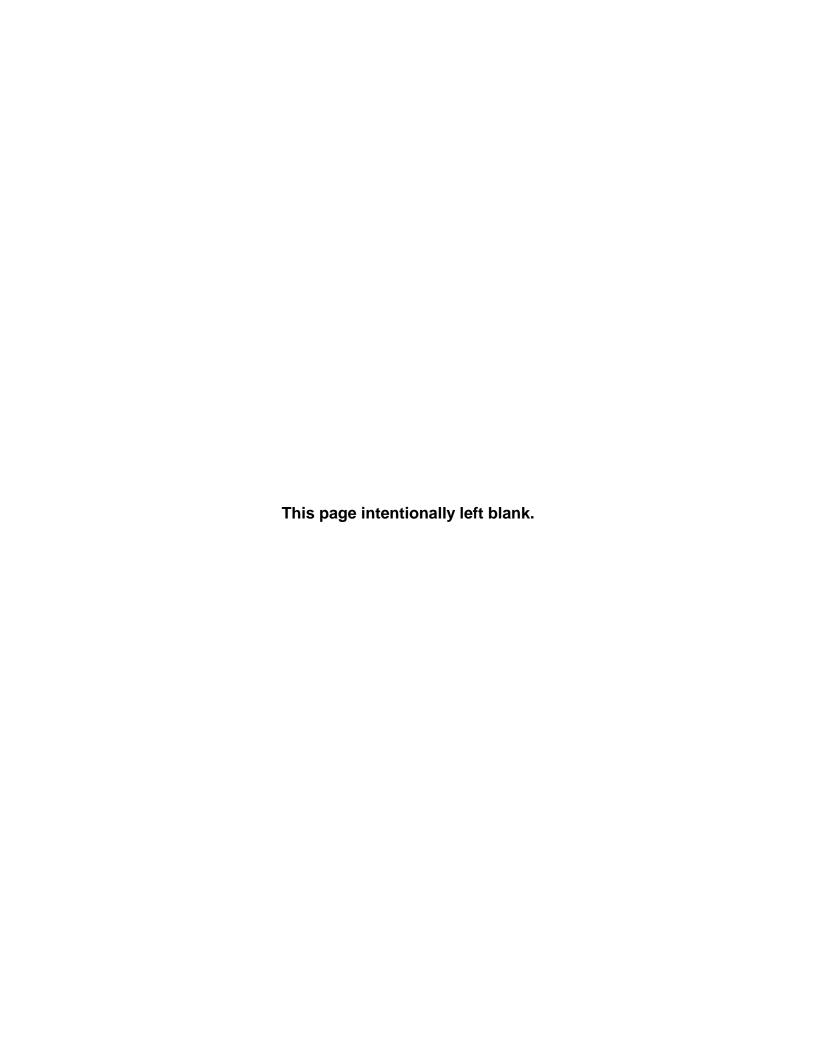




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INDEPENDENT ACCOUNTANTS' REPORT

To the Board of Directors:

We have audited the accompanying basic financial statements of the Golden Eagle Digital Academy, Stark County, Ohio, (the Academy) a component unit of the Plain Local School District, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2004, as listed in the Table of Contents. These basic financial statements are the responsibility of the Academy's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these basic financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

In our opinion, the basic financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Golden Eagle Digital Academy, Stark County, Ohio, as of June 30, 2004, and the changes in financial position and cash flows for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated December 17, 2004, on our consideration of the Academy's internal control over financial reporting and our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grants. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* and should be read in conjunction with this report in considering the results of our audit.

MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 2004 UNAUDITED

The discussion and analysis of the Golden Eagle Digital Academy's (the "Academy") financial performance provides an overall review of the Academy's financial activities for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2004. The intent of this discussion and analysis is to look at the Academy's financial performance as a whole; readers should also review the notes to the basic financial statements and financial statements to enhance their understanding of the Academy's financial performance.

Financial Highlights

Key financial highlights for 2004 are as follows:

- In total, net assets were \$164,865 at June 30 2004.
- The Academy had operating revenues of \$117,305 and operating expenses of \$230,818 for fiscal year 2004. The Academy also received \$155,925 in federal and state grants during fiscal year 2004. Total change in net assets for the fiscal year was an increase of \$42,412.

Using these Basic Financial Statements

This annual report consists of a series of financial statements and notes to those statements. These statements are organized so the reader can understand the Academy's financial activities. The *Statement of Net Assets* and *Statement of Revenues, Expenses and Changes in Net Assets* provide information about the activities of the Academy, including all short-term and long-term financial resources and obligations.

Reporting the Academy's Financial Activities

Statement of Net Assets, Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Net Assets and the Statement of Cash Flows

These documents look at all financial transactions and asks the question, "How did we do financially during 2004?" The Statement of Net Assets and the Statement of Revenues, Expenses and Changes in Net Assets answer this question. These statements include *all assets, liabilities, revenues and expenses* using the *accrual basis of accounting* similar to the accounting used by most private-sector companies. This basis of accounting takes into account all of the current year's revenues and expenses regardless of when cash is received or paid.

These two statements report the Academy's *net assets* and changes in those assets. This change in net assets is important because it tells the reader that, for the Academy as a whole, the *financial position* of the Academy has improved or diminished. The causes of this change may be the result of many factors, some financial, some not. These statements can be found on pages 7 and 8 of this report.

The statement of cash flows provides information about how the Academy finances and meets the cash flow needs of its operations. The statement of cash flows can be found on page 9 of this report.

Over time, net assets can serve as a useful indicator of a government's financial position. At June 30, 2004, the Academy's net assets totaled \$164,865.

At year-end, capital assets represented 17.07% of total assets. Capital assets consisted of furniture and equipment. There is no debt related to these capital assets. Capital assets are used to provide services to the students and are not available for future spending.



Current Financial Related Activities

The Academy is sponsored by the Plain Local School District. The Academy relies on the State Foundation Funds as well as the Federal Sub-Grants to provide the monies necessary to begin the start-up of an online educational program. The Academy will be eligible to apply for a third round of Federal Sub-Grants after round two funds have been exhausted in December 2004. These funds will help expand the current program.

The future of the Academy is dependent upon continued funding from the State Foundation Funds as no local revenue can be generated through tuition or property taxes. At this point in time the Academy is eligible to apply for one more round of Federal monies to be awarded up to an amount of \$150,000. It is the intention of the management of the Academy to pursue other State and Federal sub grants as they become available.

In conclusion, the Academy has committed itself to providing online educational opportunities to students. The management will aggressively pursue adequate funding to secure the financial stability of the Academy.

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NOTES TO BASIC FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 2004

NOTE 1 - DESCRIPTION OF THE ACADEMY

The Golden Eagle Digital Academy (the "Academy") was established pursuant to Ohio Revised Code Chapters 3314 and 3314.03 to establish a new conversion school in Plain Local School District addressing the needs of students in kindergarten through the twelfth grade. The School, which is part of the State's education program, is independent of any school district and is nonsectarian in its programs, admission policies, employment practices, and all other operations. The Academy may sue and be sued, acquire facilities as needed, and contract for any services necessary for the operation of the Academy. Management is not aware of any course of action or series of events that have occurred that might adversely affect the Academy's tax-exempt status. The Academy is considered a component unit of the Plain Local School District for reporting purposes, in accordance with Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statement No. 14.

The Academy is designed for students who have a desire for, and whose education can be optimized by, a program of online instruction in an independent environment. Because the focus is on distance learning, the ability of students to learn independently in their own homes using an online educational program is an essential element of the Academy's program.

The Academy was approved under contract with the Plain Local Schools (the "Sponsor") for a period of five years commencing July 1, 2002. The Academy began operations on August 26, 2002. The Sponsor is responsible for evaluating the performance of the Academy and has the authority to deny renewal of the contract at its expiration. The Governing Authority is responsible for the operations of the Academy.

The Academy operates under the direction of a five-member Board of Directors. The Board is composed of the Sponsor's Superintendent together with two other licensed administrators who are employed by the Sponsor. The Board also includes two other persons who are neither officers nor staff members of the Academy or Sponsor to serve as voting members. One of the members is a public educator or other public official representing a governmental entity that desires to further the establishment and operation of the Academy. The other member is a representative appointed by the Academy who within one year following the incorporation of the Academy, be replaced by a person who represents the interests of parents and students served by the Academy. The Board is responsible for carrying out the provisions of the contract, which include, but are not limited to, state-mandated provisions regarding student population, curriculum, academic goals, performance standards, admission standards and qualification of teachers.

The Academy, under a contractual agreement with Stark-Portage Area Computer Consortium (SPARCC) in partnership with Tri-Rivers Educational Computer Association (TRECA), provides planning, instructional, and technical services (See Note 9). Personnel providing services to the Academy on behalf of SPARCC in partnership with TRECA under the contractual agreement are considered employees of SPARCC and TRECA, and SPARCC and TRECA shall be solely responsible for all payroll functions. Additional personnel services are provided by the Sponsor on a purchased services basis. The Academy provides services to approximately twenty-five students.

NOTES TO BASIC FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 2004

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The basic financial statements (BFS) of the Academy have been prepared in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP) as applied to governmental units. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) is the accepted standard-setting body for establishing governmental accounting and financial reporting principles. The Academy also applies Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Statements and Interpretations issued prior to November 30, 1989, provided those pronouncements do not conflict with or contradict GASB pronouncements. The Academy has the option to also apply FASB Statements and Interpretations issued after November 30, 1989, subject to this same limitation. The Academy has elected not to apply these FASB Statements and Interpretations. The Academy's significant accounting policies are described below.

A. Basis of Presentation

Enterprise accounting is used to account for operations that are financed and operated in a manner similar to private business enterprises where the intent is that the costs (expenses) of providing goods or services to the general public on a continuing basis be financed or recovered primarily through user charges or where it has been decided that periodic determination of revenues earned, expenses incurred, and/or net income is appropriate for capital maintenance, public policy, management control, accountability or other purposes.

Operating revenues are those revenues that are generated directly from the primary activity of the Academy. Operating expenses are necessary costs incurred to provide the service that is the primary activity of the Academy. All revenues and expenses not meeting this definition are reported as non-operating.

B. Measurement Focus and Basis of Accounting

Enterprise accounting uses a flow of economic resources measurement focus. With this measurement focus, all assets and all liabilities are included on the statement of net assets. Operating statements present increases (i.e., revenues) and decreases (i.e., expenses) in net total assets. Basis of accounting refers to when revenues and expenses are recognized in the accounts and reported in the financial statements. Basis of accounting relates to the timing of the measurements made. The accrual basis of accounting is utilized for reporting purposes. Revenues are recognized when they are earned, and expenses are recognized when they are incurred.

C. Budgetary Process

Unlike other public schools located in the State of Ohio, community schools are not required to follow budgetary provisions set forth in Ohio Revised Code Section 5705, unless specifically provided in the Academy's contract with its Sponsor. The contract between the Academy and its Sponsor requires a detailed school budget for each year of the contract; however, the budget does not have to follow the provisions of Ohio Revised Code Section 5705.

D. Cash

All monies received by the Academy are deposited in a demand deposit account.

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES - (Continued)

E. Capital Assets and Depreciation

All capital assets are capitalized at cost and updated for additions and reductions during the year. Donated capital assets are recorded at their fair market value on the date donated. The Academy maintains a capitalization threshold of \$750. The Academy does not have any infrastructure. Improvements are capitalized. The costs of normal maintenance and repairs that do not add to the value of the asset or materially extend an asset's life are not capitalized.

All capital assets are depreciated. Improvements are depreciated over the remaining useful lives of the related capital assets. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method. Furniture and equipment is depreciated over five to twenty years.

F. Net Assets

Net assets represent the difference between assets and liabilities. Net assets invested in capital assets, net of accumulated depreciation. Net assets are reported as restricted when there are limitations imposed on their use through external restrictions imposed by creditors, grantors or laws or regulations of other governments.

The District applies restricted resources first when an expense is incurred for purposes for which both restricted and unrestricted net assets are available.

G. Prepayments

Certain payments to vendors reflect the costs applicable to future accounting periods and are recorded as prepaid items in the financial statements. These items are reported as assets on the statement of net assets using the consumption method. A current asset for the prepaid amounts is recorded at the time of the purchase and the expense is reported in the year in which services are consumed.

H. Intergovernmental Revenue

The Academy currently participates in the State Foundation Program through the Ohio Department of Education. Revenue from this program is recognized as operating revenue in the accounting period in which all eligibility requirements have been met.

Grants and entitlements are recognized as non-operating revenues in the accounting period in which all eligibility requirements have been met. Eligibility includes timing requirements, which specify the year when the resources are required to be used or the fiscal year when use is first permitted; matching requirements, in which the Academy must provide local resources to be used for a specified purpose; and expenditure requirements, in which the resources are provided to the Academy on a reimbursement basis. Federal and State grants for the fiscal year 2004 received by the Academy was \$155,925.

I. Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported in the financial statements and accompanying notes. Actual results may differ from those estimates.

NOTE 3 - DEPOSITS

At June 30, 2004, the carrying amount of the Academy's deposits was \$50,199 and the bank balance was \$58,139. The bank balance was covered by federal depository insurance.

NOTE 5 - RECEIVABLES

The Academy participates in the Federal Charter School Grant Program through the Ohio Department of Education. Under this program, the Academy was awarded \$150,000 during the year ended June 30, 2004 to offset start-up costs of the Academy. Revenue received from this program is recognized as grants and subsidies in the accompanying financial statements. \$100,778 of this award was receivable at June 30, 2004. This amount is presented as "Intergovernmental" on the statement of net assets. All intergovernmental receivables are considered collectible in full due to the current year guarantee of Federal funds.

NOTE 6 - RISK MANAGEMENT

The Academy is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; injuries to contracted personnel; and natural disasters. For fiscal year 2004, the Academy was named on the Sponsor's policy with Indiana Insurance Company for property and general liability insurance.

NOTE 8 – RENTAL/PERSONNEL AGREEMENT

The Academy entered into a rental/personnel agreement with the Sponsor for the use of classrooms, office space, and personnel services. This agreement was for the period of one year beginning July 1, 2003, with an automatic renewal option. Annual payments for the fiscal year 2004 were \$93,500.

NOTE 9 - SERVICE AGREEMENT

The Academy entered into a two-year agreement on November 20, 2002, for the 2002-03 and 2003-04 school years with the Stark-Portage Area Computer Consortium (SPARCC), in partnership with Tri-Rivers Educational Computer Association (TRECA), for planning, instructional, administrative and technical services required for the operation of the Academy.

For these services, the Academy is required to pay the following fees to SPARCC:

1. <u>Annual Fee</u> - The Academy shall pay \$25,000 for the 2002-03 school year for services acquired from SPARCC. The fee shall be due in two equal payments. The first installment is due upon execution of the Agreement or receipt by the Academy of the first installment paid to the Academy pursuant to the Ohio Charter Schools Federal Sub-grant Program (or any similar funding programs, regardless of name), whichever is later. The second installment is due by January 1, 2003, or upon receipt of the aforementioned first installment of such grant, whichever is later.

The Academy shall pay to SPARCC a fee of \$25,000 for the 2003-04 school year for services acquired from SPARCC. The fee shall be due in two equal payments. The first payment shall be due upon receipt by the Academy of the second installment paid to the Academy pursuant to the Ohio Charter Schools Federal Sub-grant Program (or any similar funding program, regardless of name) or by June 1, 2003, whichever is later. The second payment shall be due by December 1, 2003, or upon receipt of the aforementioned second installment of such grant, whichever is later.

2. Enrollment - \$3,500 per full time Grade 9-12 student and \$2,500 per full-time K-8 student enrolled per year. Part-time students may be enrolled on such terms as are agreed to by the parties. In case of a student enrolled with an IEP, the Academy will determine if special education will be provided by SPARCC or otherwise. If substantially all of the special education and services are provided to such a student other than by SPARCC, the Academy does not have to pay SPARCC the enrollment fee per the agreement, instead, actual costs for that student provided by SPARCC. If the special education for a student is provided by SPARCC, then any additional amount received from Department of Education for special education and related services is due to SPARCC for that student.

NOTE 9 - SERVICE AGREEMENT – (Continued)

Note: In the event that payments to the Academy from the Department of Education are reduced, the payments due from the Academy to SPARCC shall be reduced accordingly. Also, under this agreement, all obligations hereunder are contingent upon the Academy's receipt of the first installment paid to the Academy pursuant to the Ohio Charter Schools Federal Sub-grant Program. In the event the Academy does not receive a second installment under such program, the Academy may terminate the Agreement for the 2003-04 school year by giving notice to SPARCC between January 1 and June 1 immediately preceding the commencement of such school year.

NOTE 10 - DEFINED BENEFIT PENSION PLANS

The Academy has contracted with TRECA and its Sponsor to provide employee services and pay those employees. However, these contract services do not relieve the Academy of the obligation for remitting pension contributions. The retirement systems consider the Academy as the Employer-of-Record and the Academy ultimately responsible for remitting contributions to each of the systems noted below:

A. School Employees Retirement System

TRECA and the Academy's Sponsor contribute on behalf of the Academy to the School Employees Retirement System of Ohio (SERS), a cost-sharing, multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan. SERS provides retirement and disability benefits, annual cost-of-living adjustments, and death benefits to plan members and beneficiaries. Authority to establish and amend benefits is provided by State Statute Chapter 3309 of the Ohio Revised Code. SERS issues a publicly available, stand-alone financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information. The report may be obtained by writing to the School Employees Retirement System, 300 East Broad Street, Suite 100, Columbus, Ohio 43215-3476.

Plan members are required to contribute 10% of their annual covered salary and the Academy is required to contribute at an actuarially determined rate. The current rate is 14% of annual covered payroll. A portion of the Academy's contribution is used to fund pension obligations with the remainder being used to fund health care benefits; for the fiscal year 2004, 9.09% of annual covered salary was the portion to fund pension obligations. For fiscal year 2003, 8.17% was used to fund pension obligations. The contribution requirements of plan members and employers are established and may be amended, up to a statutory maximum amount, by the SERS' Retirement Board. The Academy's required contributions for pension obligations for the period August 25, 2003 through June 30, 2004, were paid by TRECA and the Academy's Sponsor.

B. State Teachers Retirement System

TRECA and the Academy's Sponsor contribute on behalf of the Academy to the State Teachers Retirement System of Ohio (STRS), a cost-sharing, multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan. STRS provides retirement and disability benefits, annual cost-of-living adjustments, and death and survivor benefits to plan members and beneficiaries. Benefits are established by Chapter 3307 of the Ohio Revised Code. STRS issues a publicly available, stand-alone financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information. The report may be obtained by writing to the State Teachers Retirement System, 275 East Broad Street, Columbus, Ohio 43215-3771, or by calling (614) 227-4090.

NOTE 10 - DEFINED BENEFIT PENSION PLANS – (Continued)

Effective July 1, 2001, two new plan options were offered to selected members. New members have a choice of three retirement plan options. In addition to the Defined Benefit (DB) Plan, new members are offered a Defined Contribution (DC) Plan and a Combined Plan. The DC Plan allows members to allocate all their member contributions and employer contributions equal to 10% of earned compensation. The Combined Plan offers features of the DC Plan and the DB Plan. In the Combined Plan, member contributions are allocated by the member, and employer contributions are used to fund a defined benefit payment at a reduced level from the regular DB Plan. Contributions into the DC Plan and the Combined Plan are credited to member accounts as employers submit their payroll information to STRS Ohio, generally on a biweekly basis. DC and Combined Plan members will transfer to the DB Plan during the fifth year of membership unless they permanently select the DC or Combined Plan.

For the fiscal year ended June 30, 2004, plan members were required to contribute 10% of their annual covered salaries. The Academy was required to contribute 14%; 13% was the portion used to fund pension obligations. As a comparison, 13% was used to fund pension obligations in 2003. Contribution rates are established by the State Teachers Retirement Board, upon recommendation of its consulting actuary, not to exceed statutory maximum rates of 10% for members and 14% for employers. The Academy's required contributions for pension obligations to STRS for the period August 25, 2003 through June 30, 2004 were paid by TRECA and the Academy's Sponsor.

NOTE 11 - POSTEMPLOYMENT BENEFITS

The Academy provides comprehensive health care benefits to retired teachers and their dependents through STRS, and to retired non-certified employees and their dependents through SERS. Benefits include hospitalization, physicians' fees, prescription drugs, and partial reimbursement of monthly Medicare Part B premiums. Benefit provisions and the obligations to contribute are established by STRS and SERS based on authority granted by state statute. Both STRS and SERS are funded on a pay-as-you-go-basis.

All STRS benefit recipients and sponsored dependents are eligible for health care coverage. The STRS Board has statutory authority over how much, if any, of the health care costs will be absorbed by STRS. Most benefit recipients pay a portion of the health care cost in the form of a monthly premium. By law, the cost of coverage paid from STRS funds shall be included in the employer contribution rate, currently 14% of covered payroll. For fiscal year ended June 30, 2004, the STRS Board allocated employer contributions equal to 1% of covered payroll to the Health Care Reserve fund.

STRS pays health care benefits from the Health Care Reserve fund. The balance in the Health Care Reserve fund was \$2.8 billion at June 30, 2003 (the latest information available). For the fiscal year ended June 30, 2003 (the latest information available), net health care costs paid by STRS were \$352.301 million and STRS had 108,294 eligible benefit recipients.

For SERS, coverage is made available to service retirees with 10 or more years of qualifying service credit, and disability and survivor benefit recipients. Members retiring on or after August 1, 1989, with less than 25 years of service credit must pay a portion of their premium for health care. The portion is based on years of service up to a maximum of 75 percent of the premium.

NOTES TO BASIC FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 2004

NOTE 11 - POSTEMPLOYMENT BENEFITS – (Continued)

After the allocation for basic benefits, the remainder of the employer's 14% contribution is allocated to providing health care benefits. For the fiscal year ended June 30, 2004, employer contributions to fund health care benefits were 4.9% of covered payroll. In addition, SERS levies a surcharge to fund health care benefits equal to 14% of the difference between a minimum pay and the member's pay, pro-rated for partial service credit. For fiscal year 2004, the minimum pay has been established at \$25,400. The surcharge, added to the unallocated portion of the 14% employer contribution rate, provides for maintenance of the asset target level for the health care fund.

The target level for the health care reserve is 150% of annual health care expenses. Expenses for health care at June 30, 2003 (the latest information available) were \$204.931 million and the target level was \$307.4 million. At June 30, 2003, (the latest information available) SERS had net assets available for payment of health care benefits of \$303.6 million and SERS had approximately 50,000 participants receiving health care benefits. The Academy's costs were paid by TRECA and the Academy's Sponsor.

NOTE 12 - SCHOOL FUNDING DECISION

On December 11, 2002, the Ohio Supreme Court issued its latest opinion regarding the state's school funding plan. The decision reaffirmed earlier decisions that Ohio's current school funding plan is unconstitutional.

The Supreme Court relinquished jurisdiction over the case and directed "...the Ohio General Assembly to enact a school funding scheme that is thorough and efficient...". The Academy is currently unable to determine what effect, if any, this decision will have on its future state funding and its financial operations.

NOTE 13 - CONTINGENCIES

A. Grants

The Academy received financial assistance from federal and state agencies in the form of grants. The expenditure of funds received under these programs generally requires compliance with terms and conditions specified in the grant agreements and is subject to audit by the grantor agencies. Any disallowed claims resulting from such audits could become a liability. However in the opinion of management, any such disallowed claims will not have a material adverse effect on the overall financial position of the Academy at June 30, 2004.

B. Litigation

A suit was filed in Franklin County Common Pleas Court, on May 14, 2001, alleging that Ohio's Community (i.e., Charter) Schools program violates the state's Constitution and state laws. On April 21, 2003 the court dismissed the counts containing constitutional claims and stayed the other counts pending appeal of the constitutional issues. The plaintiffs appealed to the Court of Appeals, the issues have been briefed, and the case was heard for oral argument on November 18th, 2003. On August 24, 2004, the Court of Appeals rendered a decision that community schools are part of the states public educational system and the matter was sent to the Ohio Supreme Court. The effect of this suit, if any, on the Academy is not presently determinable.

C. State Foundation Funding

The Ohio Department of Education conducts reviews of enrollment data and full-time equivalency (FTE) calculations made by the schools. These reviews are conducted to ensure the schools are reporting accurate student enrollment data to the State, upon which state foundation funding is calculated. The Academy was reviewed two times during this initial year of operations and zero errors were found in enrollment, withdrawals and attendance. The Ohio Department of Education owes the Academy \$6,611 as a result of the reviews.

NOTE 14 - START-UP PERIOD

The Academy began its start-up operations August 26, 2002. At June 30, 2003, the Academy recorded \$2,907 in cash, \$105,000 in grant funding receivable, and net capital assets, of \$14,546. The combination of these transactions resulted in a beginning net assets at June 30, 2003 of \$122,453.

NOTE 15 - RELATED PARTY TRANSACTION

Little Eagle Kindergarten and Plain Local Academy of Technology all have the same board members as Golden Eagle Digital Academy. There were no financial contributions between these related party entities.

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INDEPENDENT ACCOUNTANTS' REPORT ON COMPLIANCE AND ON INTERNAL CONTROL REQUIRED BY GOVERNMENT AUDITING STANDARDS

To the Board of Directors

We have audited the basic financial statements of the Golden Eagle Digital Academy, Stark County, Ohio, (the Academy) a component unit of the Plain Local School District, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2004, and have issued our report thereon dated December 17, 2004. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

Compliance

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the Academy's basic financial statements are free of material misstatement, we tested its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grants, noncompliance with which could directly and materially affect the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit and, accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance we must report under Government Auditing Standards.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit, we considered the Academy's internal control over financial reporting to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements and not to provide assurance on the internal control over financial reporting. Our consideration of the internal control over financial reporting would not necessarily disclose all matters in the internal control over financial reporting that might be material weaknesses. A material weakness is a condition in which the design or operation of one or more of the internal control components does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that misstatements in amounts that would be material in relation to the financial statements being audited may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions. We noted no matters involving the internal control over financial reporting and its operation that we consider to be material weaknesses.

However, we noted a matter involving the internal control over financial reporting that does not require inclusion, in this report, that we have reported to the Academy's management in a separate letter dated December 17, 2004.
