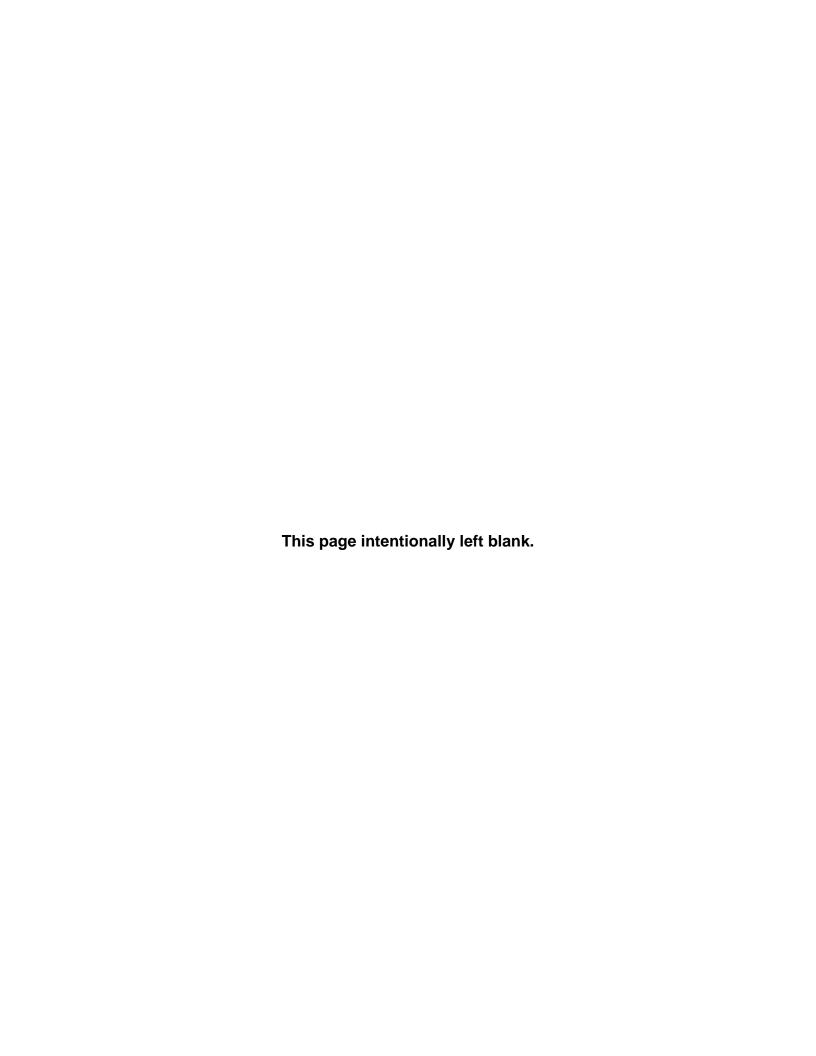

Our Report includes an opinion relating to GAAP presentation and measurement requirements, but does not imply the amounts the statements present are misstated under the non-GAAP basis you follow. The AOS report also includes an opinion on the financial statements you prepared using the cash basis and financial statement format the AOS permits.

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INDEPENDENT ACCOUNTANTS' REPORT

To the Members of the Board:

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the Mental Health Recovery Services of Warren and Clinton Counties, Warren County, Ohio (Recovery Services), as of and for the year ended December 31, 2006. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Recovery Services' management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in the Comptroller General of the United States' *Government Auditing Standards*. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to reasonably assure whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As described more fully in Note 1, the Recovery Services has prepared these financial statements using accounting practices the Auditor of State prescribes or permits. These practices differ from accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP). Although we cannot reasonably determine the effects on the financial statements of the variances between these regulatory accounting practices and GAAP, we presume they are material.

Revisions to GAAP would require the Board to reformat its financial statement presentation and make other changes effective for the year ended December 31, 2006. Instead of the fund the accompanying financial statements present for 2006, the revisions require presenting entity wide statements. While the Recovery Services does not follow GAAP, generally accepted auditing standards requires us to include the following paragraph if the statements do not substantially conform to the new GAAP presentation requirements. The Auditor of State permits, but does not require governments to reformat their statements. The Recovery Services has elected not to reformat its statements. Since Recovery Services does not use GAAP to measure financial statement amounts, the following paragraph does not imply the amounts reported are materially misstated under the accounting basis the Auditor of State permits. Our opinion on the fair presentation of the amounts reported pursuant to its non-GAAP basis is in the second following paragraph.

In our opinion, because of the effects of the matter discussed in the preceding two paragraphs, the financial statements referred to above for the year ended December 31, 2006 do not present fairly, in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, the financial position of Recovery Services as of December 31, 2006, or its changes in financial position for the year then ended.

Also, in our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the fund cash balance and reserves for encumbrances of Recovery Services, Warren County, as of December 31, 2006, and its cash receipts and disbursements for the year then ended on the accounting basis Note 1 describes.

The aforementioned revision to generally accepted accounting principles also requires the Recovery Services to include Management's Discussion and Analysis for the year ended December 31, 2006. The Recovery Services has not presented Management's Discussion and Analysis, which accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America has determined is necessary to supplement, although not required to be part of, the financial statements.

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated September 4, 2007, on our consideration of the Recovery Services' internal control over financial reporting and our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements and other matters. While we did not opine on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance, that report describes the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance, and the results of that testing. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*. You should read it in conjunction with this report in assessing the results of our audit.

We conducted our audit to opine on the Recovery Services' financial statements. The U.S. Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133, *Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations* requires presenting a federal awards expenditure schedule. The schedule is not a required part of the financial statements. We subjected the federal awards expenditure schedule to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements. In our opinion, this information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

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NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS DECEMBER 31, 2006

1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

A. Description of the Entity

The constitution and laws of the State of Ohio establish the rights and privileges of the Mental Health Recovery Services of Warren and Clinton Counties, Warren County, Ohio (Recovery Services), as a body corporate and politic. An eighteen-member Board is the governing Body. Board members are appointed by the Director of Mental Health, the Director of Alcohol and Drug Addiction Services, and the County Commissioners of both Warren and Clinton Counties.

The Recovery Services provides alcohol, drug addiction and mental health services and programs to citizens of the Mental Health and Recovery Services of Warren and Clinton Counties. Private and public agencies are the primary service providers, through Recovery Services contracts.

The Recovery Services' management believes these financial statements present all activities for which the Recovery Services is financially accountable.

B. Basis of Accounting

These financial statements follow the basis of accounting the Auditor of State prescribes or permits. This accounting basis is similar to the cash receipts and disbursements basis. The Board recognizes receipts when received in cash rather than when earned and recognizes disbursements when paid rather than when a liability is incurred. Budgetary presentations report budgetary expenditures when a commitment is made (i.e., when an encumbrance is approved).

These statements include adequate disclosure of material matters, as the Auditor of State prescribes or permits.

C. Cash

As Ohio law requires, the Warren County Treasurer is custodian for the Recovery Services' cash. The County's cash and investment pool holds the Recovery Services' cash, valued at the Warren County Treasurer's carrying amount.

D. Budgetary Process

The Ohio Revised Code requires the Recovery Services to adopt an annual budget.

1. Appropriations

Budgetary expenditures (that is, disbursements and encumbrances) may not exceed appropriations at the fund or function level of control, and appropriations may not exceed estimated resources. The Recovery Services must annually approve appropriation measures and subsequent amendments. The County Budget Commission must also approve the annual appropriation measure. Unencumbered appropriations lapse at year end.

2. Estimated Resources

Estimated resources include estimates of cash to be received (budgeted receipts) plus unencumbered cash as of January 1. The County Budget Commission must also approve estimated resources.

3. Encumbrances

The Ohio Revised Code requires the Recovery Services to reserve (encumber) appropriations when commitments are made. Encumbrances outstanding at year end are carried over, and need not be reappropriated.

A summary of 2006 budgetary activity appears in Note 2.

E. Property, Plant, and Equipment

The Recovery Services records disbursements for acquisitions of property, plant, and equipment when paid. The accompanying financial statements do not report these items as assets.

F. Accumulated Leave

In certain circumstances, such as upon leaving employment, employees are entitled to cash payments for unused leave. The financial statements do not include a liability for unpaid leave.

3. PROPERTY TAX

Real property taxes become a lien on January 1 preceding the October 1 date for which the Recovery Services adopts rates. The State Board of Tax Equalization adjusts these rates for inflation. Property taxes are also reduced for applicable homestead and rollback deductions. The financial statements include homestead and rollback amounts the State pays as Intergovernmental Receipts. Payments are due to the Counties by February 28. If the property owner elects to pay semiannually, the first half is due February 28. The second half payment is due the following July 26.

Public utilities are also taxed on personal and real property located within Warren and Clinton Counties.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS DECEMBER 31, 2006 (Continued)

3. PROPERTY TAX (Continued)

Property owners assess tangible personal property tax. They must file a list of tangible property to the Counties by each April 30.

The Counties are responsible for assessing property, and for billing, collecting, and distributing all property taxes on behalf of the Recovery Services.

4. RETIREMENT SYSTEMS

The Board's full-time employees belong to the Ohio Public Employees Retirement System (OPERS). OPERS is a cost-sharing, multiple-employer plan. The Ohio Revised Code prescribes retirement benefits, including postretirement healthcare, and survivor and disability benefits.

The Ohio Revised Code also prescribes contribution rates. For 2006 OPERS members contributed 9 percent of their gross salaries. The Recovery Services contributed an amount equal to 13.7 percent of participants' gross salaries. The Recovery Services has paid all contributions required through December 31, 2006.

5. RISK MANAGEMENT

Commercial Insurance

Recovery Services has obtained commercial insurance for the following risks:

- Comprehensive property and general liability;
- Errors and omissions.

Recovery Services also provides health insurance and dental coverage to employees through a private carrier which is provided through the fiscal agent, Warren County.

NOTE A - SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The accompanying Federal Awards Expenditures Schedule (the Schedule) summarizes activity of the Recovery Services' federal award programs. The schedule has been prepared on the cash basis of accounting.

NOTE B - SUBRECIPIENTS

Recovery Services' passes-through certain Federal assistance received from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services to other governments or not-for-profit agencies (subrecipients). As described in Note A, Recovery Services records expenditures of Federal awards to subrecipients when paid in cash.

The subrecipient agencies have certain compliance responsibilities related to administering these Federal Programs. Under Federal Circular A-133, Recovery Services is responsible for monitoring subrecipients to help assure that Federal awards are used for authorized purposes in compliance with laws, regulations, and the provisions of contracts or grant agreements, and that performance goals are achieved.

NOTE C - MATCHING REQUIREMENTS

Certain Federal programs require that Recovery Services contribute non-Federal funds (matching funds) to support the Federally-funded programs. Recovery Services has complied with the matching requirements. The expenditure of non-Federal matching funds is not included on the Schedule.
