

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Independent Accountants' Report on Applying Agreed-Upon Procedures

Morgan Township Knox County 3791 Ewart Road Mount Vernon, Ohio 43050

We have performed the procedures enumerated below, which were agreed to by the Board of Trustees and the management of Morgan Township (the Township) and the Auditor of State, on the receipts, disbursements and balances recorded in the Township's cash basis accounting records for the years ended December 31, 2020 and 2019 and certain compliance requirements related to those transactions and balances, included in the information provided to us by the management of the Township. The Township is responsible for the receipts, disbursements and balances recorded in the cash basis accounting records for the years ended December 31, 2020 and 2019 and certain compliance requirements related to these transactions and balances included in the information provided to us by the Township. The sufficiency of the procedures is solely the responsibility of the parties specified in this report. Consequently, we make no representation regarding the sufficiency of the procedures described below either for the purpose for which this report has been requested or for any other purpose.

This report only describes exceptions exceeding \$10.

Cash

- 1. We recalculated the December 31, 2020 and December 31, 2019 bank reconciliations. We found no exceptions.
- 2. We agreed the January 1, 2019 beginning fund balances recorded in the Cash Summary by Fund Report to the December 31, 2018 balances in the prior year documentation in the prior year Agreed-Upon Procedures working papers. We found no exceptions. We also agreed the January 1, 2020 beginning fund balances recorded in the Cash Summary by Fund Report to the December 31, 2019 balances in the Cash Summary by Fund Report. We found no exceptions.
- 3. We agreed the totals per the bank reconciliations to the total of the December 31, 2020 and 2019 fund cash balances reported in the Cash Summary by Fund Report and the financial statements filed by the Township in the Hinkle System. The amounts agreed.
- 4. We confirmed the December 31, 2020 bank account balance with the Township's financial institution. We found no exceptions. We also agreed the confirmed balance to the amount appearing in the December 31, 2020 bank reconciliation without exception.
- 5. We selected five reconciling debits (such as outstanding checks) from the December 31, 2020 bank reconciliation:
 - a. We traced each debit to the subsequent January bank statement. We found no exceptions.
 - b. We traced the amounts and dates to the check register, and determined the debits were dated prior to December 31. There were no exceptions.

Property Taxes and Intergovernmental Cash Receipts

- We selected a total of five receipts from the Statement of Semiannual Apportionment of Taxes, State
 Distribution Transaction Lists (DTL), and the Knox County Auditor DTL for 2020 and a total of five from
 2019:
 - a. We compared the amount from the above-named reports to the amount recorded in the Receipt Export Report. The amounts agreed.
 - We inspected the Receipt Export Report to determine these receipts were allocated to the proper funds as required by Ohio Rev. Code Sections 5705.05-.06 and 5705.10. We noted all Homestead and Rollback receipts received from the State were improperly recorded for all funds for both 2019 and 2020. The Township allocated Homestead and Rollback amounts based on rounded percentages of total Homestead and Rollback receipts. However, as the actual amount received agreed to the amount per the Statement of Semiannual Apportionment of Taxes, the Township should have recorded what was presented on the Statement of Semiannual Apportionment of Taxes. For 2019, the Ambulance and EMS Special Levy (2902) and Road Improvement Levy (2904) funds received \$134.81 and \$22.61, respectively, more than stated on the Statement of Semiannual Apportionment of Taxes. We also noted the Road and Bridge (2031) and Ambulance and EMS Special Levy (2903) funds received \$70.56 and \$83.64, respectively, less than stated on the Statement of Semiannual Apportionment of Taxes for 2019. For 2020, the Ambulance and EMS Special Levy (2902) and Road Improvement Levy (2904) funds received \$135.82 and \$22.64, respectively, more than stated on the Statement of Semiannual Apportionment of Taxes. We also noted the Road and Bridge (2031) and Ambulance and EMS Special Levy (2903) funds received \$70.90 and \$84.42, respectively, less than stated on the Statement of Semiannual Apportionment of Taxes for 2020.
 - c. We inspected the Receipt Export Report to determine whether the receipt was recorded in the proper year. The receipt was recorded in the proper year. We found no exceptions.
- 2. We inspected the Receipt Export Report to determine whether it included two real estate tax receipts for 2020 and 2019. The Receipt Export Report included the proper number of tax receipts for each year.

Debt

- 1. The prior agreed-upon procedures documentation disclosed no debt outstanding as of December 31, 2018.
- 2. We inquired of management and inspected the Receipt Export Report and Payment Export Report for evidence of debt issued during 2020 or 2019 or debt payment activity during 2020 or 2019. There were no new debt issuances, nor any debt payment activity during 2020 or 2019.

Payroll Cash Disbursements

- 1. We selected one payroll check for five employees from 2020 and one payroll check for five employees from 2019 from the Wage Withholdings Detail and Payment Export Reports and:
 - a. We compared the hours and pay rate, or salary recorded in the Wage Withholdings Detail and Payment Export Reports to supporting documentation (timecard, legislatively or statutorily-approved rate or salary). We found no exceptions.
 - b. We inspected the fund and account code(s) to which the check was posted to determine the posting was allowable based on the employees' duties as documented in the employees' personnel files and minute records. We found no exceptions.
 - c. We confirmed the payment was posted to the proper year. We found no exceptions.

2. We inspected the last remittance of tax and retirement withholdings for the year ended December 31, 2020 to confirm remittances were timely paid, and if the amounts paid agreed to the amounts withheld, plus the employer's share where applicable, during the final withholding period of 2020. We observed the following:

- 3. For the pay periods ended March 31, 2020 and November 30, 2019, we
 - a. Recomputed the allocation of the Boards' salary amounts to the General and Gasoline Fund per the Wage Withholdings Detail and Payment Export Reports.
 - b. Traced the Boards' pay for time or services performed to supporting certifications the Revised Code requires.

We found no exceptions.

- 4. We compared total gross pay for the fiscal officer and each board member for 2020 and 2019 to the compensation permitted by Ohio Revised Code Sections 507.09 and 505.24, respectively. We found no exceptions.
- 5. We inquired of management and inspected the Wage Base Summary Report for the years ended December 31, 2020 and 2019 to determine if township employees and/or trustees were reimbursed for out-of-pocket insurance premiums. No such reimbursements occurred.

Non-Payroll Cash Disbursements

- 1. We selected 10 disbursements from the Payment Export Report for the year ended December 31, 2020 and 10 from the year ended 2019 and determined whether:
 - a. The disbursements were for a proper public purpose. We found no exceptions.
 - b. The check number, date, payee name and amount recorded on the returned, canceled check agreed to the check number, date, payee name and amount recorded in the Payment Export Report and to the names and amounts on the supporting invoices. We noted as all Homestead and Rollback receipts received from the State were improperly recorded, the Township disbursed monies collected for EMS services from the EMS levies improperly. This discrepancy resulted in the Township overpaying \$29.01 for EMS services in 2019.
 - c. The payment was posted to a fund consistent with the restricted purpose for which the fund's cash can be used. We found no exceptions.
 - d. The fiscal officer certified disbursements requiring certification or issued a *Then and Now Certificate*, as required by Ohio Rev. Code Section 5705.41(D). We found no exceptions.

Compliance - Budgetary

- 1. Ohio Rev. Code Section 5705.41(B) prohibits expenditures (disbursements plus certified commitments) from exceeding appropriations. We compared total expenditures to total approved appropriations (Ohio Rev. Code Section 5705.38 and 5705.40) plus any carryover appropriations for the years ended December 31, 2020 and 2019 for the General, Gasoline Tax and Road Improvement Levy fund. There were no funds for which expenditures exceeded appropriations.
- 2. We inspected the Cash Summary by Fund Report for the years ended December 31, 2020 and 2019 for negative cash fund balances. Ohio Rev. Code Section 5705.10 (l) provides that money paid into a fund must be used for the purposes for which such fund is established. As a result, a negative fund cash balance indicates that money from one fund was used to cover the expenses of another. No funds had a negative cash fund balance.

Sunshine Law Compliance

- 1. We inquired with Township management and determined that the Township did not have a public records policy during the engagement period as required by Ohio Rev. Code § 149.43(e)(2).
- We inquired with Township management and determined that the Township did not have any completed public records requests during the engagement period. The Township did not have any denied public records requests during the engagement period. The Township did not have any public records requests with redactions during the engagement period.
- 3. We inquired with Township management and determined that the Township did not have a records retention schedule during the engagement period and therefore could not make it readily available to the public as required by Ohio Rev. Code § 149.43(B)(2).
- 4. We inquired with Township management and determined that the Township did not have a public records policy during the engagement period therefore could not provide it to the records custodian/manager as required by Ohio Rev. Code § 149.43(E)(2).
- 5. We inquired with Township management and determined that the Township did not have a public records policy during the engagement period therefore it could not be included in a policy manual as required by Ohio Rev. Code § 149.43(E)(2).
- 6. We inquired with Township management and determined that the Township did not have a public records policy during the engagement period therefore it could not be displayed in all the branches of the Township as required by Ohio Rev. Code § 149.43(E)(2).
- 7. We inquired with Township management and determined that the Township did not have any applications for record disposal submitted to the Records Commission during the engagement period.
- 8. We inspected the individual training certificates and determined whether each elected official in accordance with Ohio Rev. Code § 149.43(E)(1) (or his/her designee) successfully attended a certified three-hour Public Records Training for each term of office as required by Ohio Rev. Code § 109.43(B). We noted while the Fiscal Officer successfully completed required training for her 2016 to 2020 term and acted as the designee for the members of the Board of Trustees, she has yet to complete the training required for the 2020 to 2024 term
- 9. We inspected the public notices for the public meetings held during the engagement period and determined the Township notified the general public and news media of when and where meetings during the engagement period were to be held as required by Ohio Rev. Code § 121.22(F). We found no exceptions.

- 10. We inspected the minutes of public meetings during the engagement period in accordance with Ohio Rev. Code § 121.22(C) and determined whether they were:
 - a. Prepared a file is created following the date of the meeting
 - b. Filed placed with similar documents in an organized manner
 - c. Maintained retained, at a minimum, for the engagement period
 - d. Open to public inspection available for public viewing or request.

We found no exceptions.

- 11. We inspected the minutes from the engagement period in accordance with Ohio Rev. Code § 121.22(G) and determined the following:
 - a. Executive sessions were only held at regular or special meetings.
 - b. The purpose for the meetings and going into an executive session (when applicable) correlated with one of the matters listed in Ohio Rev. Code Section 121.22(G).
 - c. Formal governing board actions were adopted in open meetings.

We found no exceptions.

HB 481 / HB 614 Coronavirus Relief Fund (CRF) Compliance

- 1. We inquired of management and those charged with governance and documented how the Township decided to spend their CRF allocations and how the Township evaluated and documented their compliance with the CARES Act three-prong test. We then selected the three payroll, non-payroll, and subgrant/subloan transactions. and determined the Township:
 - Spent the CRF money (including additional distributions or redistributions) in accordance with use of funds requirements, and
 - b. Maintained appropriate supporting documentation.

We noted while all disbursements were spent in accordance with the use of funds requirements and proper support was maintained by the Township, we noted an instance where the Township improperly reimbursed the Fiscal Officer for \$51 of sales tax when reimbursing the Fiscal Officer for cleaning supplies and equipment purchases.

2. We inquired with management and inspected the Appropriation Ledgers Report to determine the Township did not have an unencumbered balance of money to pay back to the county treasurer. We found no exceptions.

Other Compliance

- 1. Ohio Rev. Code Section 117.38 requires townships to file their financial information in the HINKLE system within 60 days after the close of the fiscal year. This statute also permits the Auditor of State to extend the deadline for filing a financial report and establish terms and conditions for any such extension. Auditor of State established policies regarding the filing of complete financial statements, as defined in AOS Bulletin 2015-007 in the Hinkle System. We confirmed the Township filed their complete financial statements, as defined by AOS Bulletin 2015-007 and Auditor of State established policy, within the allotted timeframe for the years ended December 31, 2020 and 2019 in the Hinkle system. There were no exceptions.
- 2. We inquired of the fiscal officer and inspected the Fiscal Integrity Act Portal (http://www.ohioauditor.gov/fiscalintegrity/default.html) to determine whether the fiscal officer obtained the training required by Ohio Rev. Code Section 507.12 and 733.81. We noted while Fiscal Officer obtained all 12 hours of the required training, however, the Fiscal Officer has yet to complete the Ethics or Public Records Training Requirements.

This agreed-upon procedures engagement was conducted in accordance with the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants attestation standards and applicable attestation engagement standards included in the Comptroller General of the United States' *Government Auditing Standards*. We were not engaged to, and did not conduct an examination or review, the objective of which would be the expression of an opinion or conclusion, respectively, on the Township's receipts, disbursements, balances and compliance with certain laws and regulations. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion or conclusion. Had we performed additional procedures, other matters might have come to our attention that would have been reported to you.

This report is to provide assistance in the evaluation of the Township's receipts, disbursements and balances recorded in their cash-basis accounting records for the years ended December 31, 2020 and 2019, and certain compliance requirements related to these transactions and balances and is not suitable for any other purpose.
