#### Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements

#### **Opinion**

We have audited the cash basis financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Richland County Family and Children First Council, Richland County, Ohio (the Council), as of and for the year ended December 31, 2021, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Council's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective cash basis financial position of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Council, as of December 31, 2021, and the respective changes in cash-basis financial position for the year then ended in accordance with the cash-basis of accounting described in Note 2.

#### **Basis for Opinion**

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAS) and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements* section of our report. We are required to be independent of the Council, and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

#### Emphasis of Matter - Accounting Basis

We draw attention to Note 2 of the financial statements, which describes the basis of accounting. The financial statements are prepared on the cash basis of accounting, which is a basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Our opinion is not modified with respect to this matter.

#### Emphasis of Matter

As discussed in Note 6 to the financial statements, the financial impact of COVID-19 and the ensuing emergency measures will impact subsequent periods of the Council. We did not modify our opinions regarding this matter.

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#### Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with the cash basis of accounting described in Note 2, and for determining that the cash basis of accounting is an acceptable basis for preparation of the financial statements in the circumstances. Management is also responsible for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Council's ability to continue as a going concern for twelve months beyond the financial statement date, including any currently known information that may raise substantial doubt shortly thereafter.

#### Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinions. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with GAAS and *Government Auditing Standards* will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with GAAS and Government Auditing Standards, we

- exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such procedures include examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements.
- obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Council's internal control. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.
- evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.
- conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that
  raise substantial doubt about the Council's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable
  period of time.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control-related matters that we identified during the audit.

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#### Other Information

We applied no procedures to management's discussion & analysis as listed in the table of contents. Accordingly, we express no opinion or any other assurance on it.

#### Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated July 28, 2022, on our consideration of the Council's internal control over financial reporting and our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the Council's internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the Council's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

#### MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS FOR THE YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2021 (UNAUDITED)

The management's discussion and analysis of the Richland County Family and Children First Council's (the "Council") financial performance provides an overall review of the Council's financial activities for the year ended December 31, 2021, within the limitations of the Council's cash basis of accounting. The intent of this discussion and analysis is to look at the Council's financial performance as a whole; readers should also review the cash-basis basic financial statements and the notes to the financial statements to enhance their understanding of the Council's financial performance.

#### **Financial Highlights**

Key financial highlights for 2021 are as follows:

- The total net cash position of the governmental activities decreased \$362,666, which represents a 18.37% decrease from fiscal year 2020.
- The Council had \$1,980,437 in cash disbursements related to governmental activities; \$1,617,771 of these cash disbursements were offset by program specific grants or contributions.
- The Council's major funds are the General Fund and the Help Me Grow Fund. The General Fund had cash receipts of \$1,273,790 in 2021. The cash disbursements of the General Fund totaled \$1,595,809 in 2021. The General Fund's cash balance decreased \$322,019 from 2020 to 2021.
- The Help Me Grow Fund had cash receipts of \$267,917 in 2021 and cash disbursements of \$281,103. The Help Me Grow Fund's cash balance decreased \$13,186.

#### Using these Basic Financial Statements (BFS)

This annual report is presented in a format consistent with the presentation requirements of the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statement No. 34, as applicable to the Council's cash basis of accounting.

The Statement of Net Position - Cash Basis and Statement of Activities - Cash Basis provide information about the activities of the whole Council, presenting both an aggregate view of the Council's cash basis finances. Fund financial statements provide the next level of detail. For governmental funds, these statements tell how services were financed in the short-term as well as what remains for future spending. The fund financial statements also look at the Council's most significant funds with all other nonmajor funds presented in total in one column. In the case of the Council, the General Fund and the Help Me Grow fund are the only two major governmental funds. The Council had one nonmajor governmental fund.

#### Reporting the Council as a Whole

#### Statement of Net Position and the Statement of Activities

The Statement of Net Position - Cash Basis and the Statement of Activities - Cash Basis answer the question, "How did we do financially during 2021?" These statements include *only net position* using the *cash basis of accounting*, which is a basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. This basis of accounting takes into account only the current year's receipts and disbursements if the cash is actually received or paid.

These two statements report the Council's net position and changes in net cash position on a cash basis. This change in net cash position is important because it tells the reader that, for the Council as a whole, the cash basis financial position of the Council has improved or diminished. The causes of this change may be the result of many factors, some financial, some not. Non-financial factors include the Council's facility conditions, mandated federal and State programs and other factors.

#### MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS FOR THE YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2021 (UNAUDITED)

As a result of the use of the cash basis of accounting, certain assets and their related revenues (such as accounts receivable and revenue for billed or provided services not collected) and liabilities and their related expenses (such as accounts payable and expenses for goods or services received, but not yet paid and accrued expenses and liabilities) are not recorded in these financial statements. Therefore, when reviewing the financial information and discussion within this annual report, the reader should keep in mind the limitations resulting from the use of the cash basis of accounting.

In the Statement of Net Position - Cash Basis and the Statement of Activities - Cash Basis, the governmental activities includes the Council's programs and services including subsidy services and other community services.

The Statement of Net Position - Cash Basis and the Statement of Activities - Cash Basis can be found on pages 9-10 of this report.

#### Reporting the Council's Most Significant Funds

#### Fund Financial Statements

A fund is a grouping of related accounts that is used to maintain control over resources that have been segregated for specific activities or objectives. The Council, like other State and local governments, uses fund accounting to ensure and demonstrate compliance with finance-related legal requirements. All of the funds of the Council can be divided into three categories: governmental funds, proprietary funds, and fiduciary funds. The Council has no proprietary or fiduciary funds.

Fund financial reports provide detailed information about the Council's major funds. The Council uses several funds to account for its financial transactions. However, these financial statements focus on the Council's most significant funds. The Council's only major governmental funds are the General Fund and the Help Me Grow Fund. The analysis of the Council's major governmental funds begins on page 7.

#### Governmental Funds

The Council's activities are reported in governmental funds, which focus on how money flows into and out of those funds and the balances left at year-end available for spending in future periods. These funds are reported using the cash basis of accounting, which is a basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. The governmental fund statements provide a detailed view of the Council's general government operations and the basic services it provides. Governmental fund information helps you determine whether there are more or fewer cash basis financial resources that can be readily spent to finance various Council programs. Since the Council is reporting on the cash basis of accounting, there are no differences in the net position and fund cash balances or changes in net position and changes in fund cash balances. Therefore, no reconciliation is necessary between such financial statements. The governmental fund statements can be found on pages 11-12 of this report.

#### Notes to the Financial Statements

The notes provide additional information that is essential to full understanding of the data provided in the government-wide and fund financial statements. The notes to the financial statements can be found on pages 13-18 of this report.

#### **Government-Wide Financial Analysis**

Recall that the statement of net position - cash basis provides the perspective of the Council as a whole.

#### **Governmental Activities**

Governmental cash position decreased \$362,666 in 2021 from 2020. Total governmental cash disbursements of \$1,980,437 were offset by program cash receipts of \$1,617,771.

The primary sources of cash receipts for governmental activities are derived from operating grants and contributions. This includes Federal grants, State grants and local funding.

The primary cash disbursement activity relates to subsidy services. Other community services accounts for operations costs and the fiscal agent fee.



#### Financial Analysis of the Government's Funds

As noted earlier, the Council uses fund accounting to ensure and demonstrate compliance with finance-related legal requirements.

#### Governmental Funds

The Council's governmental funds are accounted for using the cash basis of accounting.

The Council's governmental funds reported a combined fund cash balance of \$1,611,323 which is \$362,666 below last year's total of \$1,973,989. The schedule below indicates the fund cash balance and the total change in fund cash balance as of December 31, 2020 and 2021, for all major and nonmajor governmental funds.

#### General Fund

The General Fund had cash receipts of \$1,273,790 in 2021. The cash disbursements of the General Fund totaled \$1,595,809 in 2021. The General Fund's cash balance decreased \$322,019 from 2021 to 2020.

#### Help Me Grow Fund

The Help Me Grow Fund, a Council major fund had cash receipts of \$267,917 in 2021. The Help Me Grow Fund had cash disbursements of \$281,103 in 2021. The Help Me Grow Fund cash balance decreased \$13,186 from 2020 to 2021.

#### **Capital Assets and Debt Administration**

#### Capital Assets

The Council does not record capital assets in the accompanying basic financial statements, but records payments for capital assets as disbursements. The Council had no capital outlay disbursements during fiscal year 2021.

#### **Debt Administration**

The Council had no long-term debt obligations outstanding at December 31, 2021 and 2020.

#### **Current Financial Related Activities**

The Council is reviewed by its members and the community to determine how they can realize efficiency and service gap filling. Agencies are challenged to improve the way services are delivered by striving towards a seamless service delivery system. The Council is constantly assessing needs of its members and acting to facilitate the provision of services cost-effectively.

### NOTES TO THE BASIC FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2021

#### NOTE 1 - DESCRIPTION OF THE COUNCIL

Ohio Revised Code Section 121.37, created the Ohio Family and Children First Cabinet Council and permitted counties to establish county family and children first councils. Statutory membership of a county council consists of the following individuals:

- a. At least three individuals who are not employed by an agency represented on the Council and whose families are or have received services from an agency represented on the Council or on the council of another county's council. Where possible, the number of members representing families shall be equal to twenty percent of the Council's remaining membership;
- b. The director of the Board of Alcohol, Drug Addiction and Mental Health Services that serves the county, or, in the case of a county that has a Board of Alcohol and Drug Addiction Services and a Community Mental Health Board, the Directors of both Boards. If a Board of Alcohol, Drug Addiction, and Mental Health Services covers more than one County, the Director may designate a person to participate on the County's Council;
- c. The Health Commissioner, or the Commissioner's designee, of the Board of Health of each City or General Health Council in the County. If the county has two or more health Councils, the Health Commissioner membership may be limited to the Commissioners of the two Councils with the largest populations;
- d. The Director of the County Department of Job and Family Services;
- e. The Executive Director of the public children service agency;
- f. The Superintendent of the County Board of Developmental Disabilities or, if the Superintendent serves as Superintendent of more than one County Board of Developmental Disabilities, the Superintendent's designee;
- g. The Superintendent of the city, exempted village, or local school Council with the largest number of pupils residing in the County, as determined by the Ohio Department of Education, which shall notify each County of its determination at least biennially;
- h. A School Superintendent representing all other school Councils with territory in the County, as designated at a biennial meeting of the superintendents of those Councils;
- i. A representative of the municipal corporation with the largest population in the County;
- j. The President of the Board of County Commissioners or an individual designated by the Board;
- k. A representative of the regional office of the Ohio Department of Youth Services;
- 1. A representative of the County's Head Start agencies, as defined in Ohio Revised Code Section 3301.32;
- m. A representative of the County's Early Intervention collaborative established pursuant to the federal early intervention program operated under the "Individuals with Disabilities Education Act of 2004"; and,
- n. A representative of a local nonprofit entity that funds, advocates, or provides services to children and families.

A County Family and Children First Council may invite any other local public or private agency or group that funds, advocates, or provides services to children to have a representative become a permanent or temporary member of the Council.

### NOTES TO THE BASIC FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2021

#### NOTE 1 - DESCRIPTION OF THE COUNCIL - (Continued)

The purpose of the County Council is to streamline and coordinate existing government services for families seeking services for their children. In seeking to fulfill its purpose, a County Council shall provide the following:

- a. Referrals to the Cabinet Council those children for whom the County Council cannot provide adequate services;
- b. Development and implementation of a process that annually evaluates and prioritizes services, fills service gaps where possible, and invents new approaches to achieve better results for families of children;
- c. Participate in the development of a county wide, comprehensive, coordinated, multi-disciplinary, interagency system for infants and toddlers with developmental disabilities or delays and their families, as established pursuant to federal grants received and administered by the Department of Health for early intervention services under the "Individuals with Disabilities Education Act of 2004";
- d. Maintenance of an accountability system to monitor the County Council's progress in achieving results for families and children; and,
- e. Establishment of a mechanism to ensure ongoing input from a broad representation of families who are receiving services within the County system.

#### NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

As discussed further in Note 2.B., these financial statements for the Richland County Family and Children First Council (the "Council") are presented on a cash basis of accounting. This cash basis of accounting differs from accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP). GAAP includes all relevant Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) pronouncements, which have been applied to the extent they are applicable to the cash basis of accounting. In cases where these cash basis statements contain items that are the same as, or similar to, those items in the financial statements prepared in conformity with GAAP, similar informative disclosures are provided. Following are the more significant of the Council's accounting policies:

#### A. Reporting Entity

A reporting entity is comprised of the primary government and other organizations that are included to ensure that the financial statements are not misleading. The primary government of the Council consists of all funds, departments and activities that are not legally separate from the Council. They comprise the Council's legal entity which provides various services including human, social, health and educational services to families and children. The Council, the Executive Committee and the Executive Director have direct responsibility for these activities.

#### B. Basis of Accounting

The Council's financial statements are prepared using the cash basis of accounting. Receipts are recorded in the Council's financial records and reported in the financial statements when cash is received rather than when earned and disbursements are recorded when cash is paid rather than when a liability is incurred. These statements include adequate disclosure of material matters, in accordance with the basis of accounting described in this paragraph.

As a result of the use of this cash basis of accounting, certain assets and their related revenues (such as accounts receivable and revenue for billed or provided services not yet collected) and certain liabilities and their related expenses (such as accounts payable and expenses for goods or services received, but not yet paid and accrued expenses and liabilities) are not recorded in these financial statements.

### NOTES TO THE BASIC FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2021

#### NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES - (Continued)

#### C. Fund Accounting

The Council uses funds to maintain its financial records during the year. Fund accounting is a concept developed to meet the needs of governmental entities in which legal or other restraints require the recording of specific receipts and disbursements. The transactions of each fund are reflected in a self-balancing group of accounts. The Council reports only governmental funds.

**Governmental Funds** - The Council classifies funds financed primarily from intergovernmental receipts (e.g. grants) and other nonexchange transactions as governmental funds. The following are the Council's major governmental funds:

<u>General</u> - The general fund is the operating fund of the Council. It is used to account for all financial resources except those required to be accounted for in another fund.

<u>Help Me Grow</u> - This fund receives Federal and State funds to implement and maintain a coordinated, community-based infrastructure that promotes trans-disciplinary, family-centered services for expectant parents, newborns, infants and toddlers and their families.

Other governmental funds of the Council are used to account for grants and other resources whose use is restricted to an expenditure for specified purposes.

#### D. Basis of Presentation and Measurement Focus

Government-Wide Statement of Activities - Cash Basis - This statement displays information about the Council as a whole. The government-wide statement of activities - cash basis compares disbursements with program receipts for each function or program of the Council's governmental activities. These disbursements are those that are specifically associated with a service, program or department and are therefore clearly identifiable to a particular function. Program receipts include grants and contributions that are restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a particular program. Receipts which are not classified as program receipts are presented as general receipts of the Council. The comparison of direct disbursements with program receipts identifies the extent to which each governmental function is self-financing on the cash basis or draws from the general receipts of the Council.

<u>Fund Financial Statements</u> - Fund financial statements report detailed information about the Council. The focus of governmental fund financial statements is on major funds. Each major fund is presented in a separate column. Nonmajor funds are aggregated and presented in a single column.

#### E. Budgetary Process

The Ohio Revised Code Section 121.37 (B)(4) requires the Council to file an annual budget with its administrative agent. For fiscal year 2021, a budget was prepared and filed based on the administrative agency (Richland County Job and Family Services) fiscal year, July 1, 2021 through June 30, 2022.

### NOTES TO THE BASIC FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2021

#### NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES - (Continued)

#### F. Administrative/Fiscal Agent

Section 121.37 (B)(5)(a) of the Ohio Revised Code, requires each county council to designate an administrative agent for the Council. Richland County Job and Family Services (the "County") serves as the Council's administrative agent. The County maintains the Council as an agency fund on their financial records. The administrative agent agrees to:

- 1. Serve as the Council's appointing authority;
- Exercise spending authority within the limits of the annual budget developed and approved by the Council; and,
- 3. Perform the following on behalf of Council; but only upon the expressed approval of and direction by Council;
  - Enter into written agreements or administer contracts with public or private entities to fulfill specific Council business.
  - Provide financial stipends, reimbursements or both to family representatives for expenses related to Council activity.
  - Receive by gift, grant, devise or bequest any moneys, land or other property for the purposes for which the Council is established.

#### G. Capital Assets

Acquisition of property, plant and equipment purchased are recorded as disbursements when paid. These items are not reflected as assets on the accompanying financial statements.

#### H. Fund Cash Balance

The Council reports classifications of fund cash balance based on the extent to which the Council is bound to honor constraints on the specific purposes for which amounts in those funds can be spent. The following categories are used:

Nonspendable - amounts that cannot be spent because they are either (a) not in spendable form or (b) legally required to be maintained intact.

Restricted - amounts that have constraints placed on the use of resources that are either (a) externally imposed by creditors, grantors, contributors, or laws or regulations of other governments, or (b) imposed by law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation.

Committed - amounts that can only be used for specific purposes pursuant to constraints imposed by formal action of the Council's highest level of decision-making authority, Cabinet Council.

Assigned - amounts that are constrained by the Council's intent to be used for specific purpose, but are neither restricted nor committed. Assigned amounts include those approved through the Council's formal purchasing procedure by the fiscal agent. Through the Council's purchasing policy, the Cabinet Council has given the fiscal agent the authority to constrain monies for intended purposes.

Unassigned - residual fund balance within the general fund that is in spendable form that is not restricted, committed, or assigned.

### NOTES TO THE BASIC FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2021

#### NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES - (Continued)

The Council applies restricted resources first when an expense is incurred for purposes for which restricted and unrestricted fund balance is available. The Council considers committed, assigned, and unassigned fund balances, respectively, to be spent when expenditures are incurred for purposes for which any of the unrestricted fund balance classifications could be used.

#### I. Net Position

Net position is reported as restricted when enabling legislation or creditors, grantors or laws or regulations of other governments have imposed limitations on their use. The Council has no net position restricted by enabling legislation.

The Council first applies restricted resources when a disbursement is incurred for purposes for which both restricted and unrestricted net position are available.

#### J. Contracted Services

The Council director is an employee of Richland County and paid directly by the Council. The assistant of the Council is a paid employee of the City of Mansfield and the Council reimburses the cost of her payroll to the City of Mansfield. The funds used to pay their salaries are derived from a State Administrative grant and local agency membership contributions received by the Council and maintained by the County.

#### **NOTE 3 - EQUITY IN POOLED CASH**

The Richland County Treasurer's Office maintains a depository which includes the funds of the Council. The Ohio Revised Code prescribes allowable deposits and investments. The Council's carrying amount of cash on deposit with the fiscal agent at December 31, 2021, was \$1,611,323. The fiscal agent for the Council is responsible for maintaining adequate depository collateral for all funds in the County's investment accounts.

#### **NOTE 4 - CONTINGENT LIABILITIES**

Amounts received from grantor agencies are subject to audit and adjustment by the grantor. Any disallowed costs may require refunding to the grantor. Amounts which may be disallowed, if any, are not presently determinable. However, based on prior experience, management believes such refunds, if any, would not be material.

#### **NOTE 5 - RISK MANAGEMENT**

Insurance for comprehensive property and general liability is provided by the Council's administrative agent.

#### **NOTE 6 - COVID-19**

The United States and the State of Ohio declared a state of emergency in March of 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Ohio's state of emergency ended in June, 2021 while the national state of emergency continues. The financial impact of COVID-19 and the continuing emergency measures will impact subsequent periods of the Council. The impact on the Council's future operating costs, revenues, and additional recovery from emergency funding, either federal or state, cannot be estimated.

#### Report on Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements, we considered the Council's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) as a basis for designing audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purposes of expressing our opinions on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Council's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Council's internal control.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the Council's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected, on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies. #### Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying cash basis financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Richland County Family and Children First Council, Richland County, Ohio (the Council), as of and for the year ended December 31, 2020, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Council's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

#### Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

#### MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS FOR THE YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2020 (UNAUDITED)

The management's discussion and analysis of the Richland County Family and Children First Council's (the "Council") financial performance provides an overall review of the Council's financial activities for the year ended December 31, 2020, within the limitations of the Council's cash basis of accounting. The intent of this discussion and analysis is to look at the Council's financial performance as a whole; readers should also review the cash-basis basic financial statements and the notes to the financial statements to enhance their understanding of the Council's financial performance.

#### **Financial Highlights**

Key financial highlights for 2020 are as follows:

- The total net cash position of the governmental activities increased \$225,098, which represents a 12.87% increase from fiscal year 2019.
- The Council had \$1,469,582 in cash disbursements related to governmental activities; \$1,694,680 of these cash disbursements were offset by program specific grants or contributions.
- The Council's major funds are the General Fund and the Help Me Grow Fund. The General Fund had cash receipts of \$1,232,502 in 2020. The cash disbursements of the General Fund totaled \$1,000,609 in 2020. The General Fund's cash balance increased \$231,893 from 2019 to 2020.
- The Help Me Grow Fund had cash receipts of \$228,426 in 2020 and cash disbursements of \$243,348. The Help Me Grow Fund's cash balance decreased \$14,922.

#### Using these Basic Financial Statements (BFS)

This annual report is presented in a format consistent with the presentation requirements of the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statement No. 34, as applicable to the Council's cash basis of accounting.

The Statement of Net Position - Cash Basis and Statement of Activities - Cash Basis provide information about the activities of the whole Council, presenting both an aggregate view of the Council's cash basis finances. Fund financial statements provide the next level of detail. For governmental funds, these statements tell how services were financed in the short-term as well as what remains for future spending. The fund financial statements also look at the Council's most significant funds with all other nonmajor funds presented in total in one column. In the case of the Council, the General Fund and the Help Me Grow fund are the only two major governmental funds. The Council had one nonmajor governmental fund.

#### Reporting the Council as a Whole

#### Statement of Net Position and the Statement of Activities

The Statement of Net Position - Cash Basis and the Statement of Activities - Cash Basis answer the question, "How did we do financially during 2020?" These statements include *only net position* using the *cash basis of accounting*, which is a basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. This basis of accounting takes into account only the current year's receipts and disbursements if the cash is actually received or paid.

These two statements report the Council's net position and changes in net cash position on a cash basis. This change in net cash position is important because it tells the reader that, for the Council as a whole, the cash basis financial position of the Council has improved or diminished. The causes of this change may be the result of many factors, some financial, some not. Non-financial factors include the Council's facility conditions, mandated federal and State programs and other factors.

#### MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS FOR THE YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2020 (UNAUDITED)

As a result of the use of the cash basis of accounting, certain assets and their related revenues (such as accounts receivable and revenue for billed or provided services not collected) and liabilities and their related expenses (such as accounts payable and expenses for goods or services received, but not yet paid and accrued expenses and liabilities) are not recorded in these financial statements. Therefore, when reviewing the financial information and discussion within this annual report, the reader should keep in mind the limitations resulting from the use of the cash basis of accounting.

In the Statement of Net Position - Cash Basis and the Statement of Activities - Cash Basis, the governmental activities includes the Council's programs and services including subsidy services and other community services.

The Statement of Net Position - Cash Basis and the Statement of Activities - Cash Basis can be found on pages 27-28 of this report.

#### Reporting the Council's Most Significant Funds

#### Fund Financial Statements

A fund is a grouping of related accounts that is used to maintain control over resources that have been segregated for specific activities or objectives. The Council, like other State and local governments, uses fund accounting to ensure and demonstrate compliance with finance-related legal requirements. All of the funds of the Council can be divided into three categories: governmental funds, proprietary funds, and fiduciary funds. The Council has no proprietary or fiduciary funds.

Fund financial reports provide detailed information about the Council's major funds. The Council uses several funds to account for its financial transactions. However, these financial statements focus on the Council's most significant funds. The Council's only major governmental funds are the General Fund and the Help Me Grow Fund. The analysis of the Council's major governmental funds begins on page 25.

#### Governmental Funds

The Council's activities are reported in governmental funds, which focus on how money flows into and out of those funds and the balances left at year-end available for spending in future periods. These funds are reported using the cash basis of accounting, which is a basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. The governmental fund statements provide a detailed view of the Council's general government operations and the basic services it provides. Governmental fund information helps you determine whether there are more or fewer cash basis financial resources that can be readily spent to finance various Council programs. Since the Council is reporting on the cash basis of accounting, there are no differences in the net position and fund cash balances or changes in net position and changes in fund cash balances. Therefore, no reconciliation is necessary between such financial statements. The governmental fund statements can be found on pages 29-30 of this report.

#### Notes to the Financial Statements

The notes provide additional information that is essential to full understanding of the data provided in the government-wide and fund financial statements. The notes to the financial statements can be found on pages 31-36 of this report.

#### **Government-Wide Financial Analysis**

Recall that the statement of net position - cash basis provides the perspective of the Council as a whole.

#### **Governmental Activities**

Governmental cash position increased \$225,098 in 2020 from 2019. Total governmental cash disbursements of \$1,469,582 were offset by program cash receipts of \$1,694,680.

The primary sources of cash receipts for governmental activities are derived from operating grants and contributions. This includes Federal grants, State grants and local funding.

The primary cash disbursement activity relates to subsidy services. Other community services accounts for operations costs and the fiscal agent fee.



#### Financial Analysis of the Government's Funds

As noted earlier, the Council uses fund accounting to ensure and demonstrate compliance with finance-related legal requirements.

#### Governmental Funds

The Council's governmental funds are accounted for using the cash basis of accounting.

The Council's governmental funds reported a combined fund cash balance of \$1,973,989 which is \$225,098 above last year's total of \$1,748,891. The schedule below indicates the fund cash balance and the total change in fund cash balance as of December 31, 2019 and 2020, for all major and nonmajor governmental funds.

#### General Fund

The General Fund had cash receipts of \$1,232,502 in 2020. The cash disbursements of the General Fund totaled \$1,000,609 in 2020. The General Fund's cash balance increased \$231,893 from 2019 to 2020.

#### Help Me Grow Fund

The Help Me Grow Fund, a Council major fund had cash receipts of \$228,426 in 2020. The Help Me Grow Fund had cash disbursements of \$243,348 in 2020. The Help Me Grow Fund cash balance decreased \$14,922 from 2019 to 2020.

#### **Capital Assets and Debt Administration**

#### Capital Assets

The Council does not record capital assets in the accompanying basic financial statements, but records payments for capital assets as disbursements. The Council had no capital outlay disbursements during fiscal year 2020.

#### **Debt Administration**

The Council had no long-term debt obligations outstanding at December 31, 2020 and 2019.

#### **Current Financial Related Activities**

The Council is reviewed by its members and the community to determine how they can realize efficiency and service gap filling. Agencies are challenged to improve the way services are delivered by striving towards a seamless service delivery system. The Council is constantly assessing needs of its members and acting to facilitate the provision of services cost-effectively.

### NOTES TO THE BASIC FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2020

#### NOTE 1 - DESCRIPTION OF THE COUNCIL

Ohio Revised Code Section 121.37, created the Ohio Family and Children First Cabinet Council and permitted counties to establish county family and children first councils. Statutory membership of a county council consists of the following individuals:

- a. At least three individuals who are not employed by an agency represented on the Council and whose families are or have received services from an agency represented on the Council or on the council of another county's council. Where possible, the number of members representing families shall be equal to twenty percent of the Council's remaining membership;
- b. The director of the Board of Alcohol, Drug Addiction and Mental Health Services that serves the county, or, in the case of a county that has a Board of Alcohol and Drug Addiction Services and a Community Mental Health Board, the Directors of both Boards. If a Board of Alcohol, Drug Addiction, and Mental Health Services covers more than one County, the Director may designate a person to participate on the County's Council;
- c. The Health Commissioner, or the Commissioner's designee, of the Board of Health of each City or General Health Council in the County. If the County has two or more health Councils, the Health Commissioner membership may be limited to the Commissioners of the two Councils with the largest populations;
- d. The Director of the County Department of Job and Family Services;
- e. The Executive Director of the public children service agency;
- f. The Superintendent of the County Board of Developmental Disabilities or, if the Superintendent serves as Superintendent of more than one County Board of Developmental Disabilities, the Superintendent's designee;
- g. The Superintendent of the city, exempted village, or local school Council with the largest number of pupils residing in the County, as determined by the Ohio Department of Education, which shall notify each County of its determination at least biennially;
- h. A School Superintendent representing all other school Councils with territory in the County, as designated at a biennial meeting of the superintendents of those Councils;
- i. A representative of the municipal corporation with the largest population in the County;
- j. The President of the Board of County Commissioners or an individual designated by the Board;
- k. A representative of the regional office of the Ohio Department of Youth Services;
- 1. A representative of the County's Head Start agencies, as defined in Ohio Revised Code Section 3301.32;
- m. A representative of the County's Early Intervention collaborative established pursuant to the federal early intervention program operated under the "Individuals with Disabilities Education Act of 2004"; and,

#### NOTE 1 - DESCRIPTION OF THE COUNCIL - (Continued)

 A representative of a local nonprofit entity that funds, advocates, or provides services to children and families.

A County Family and Children First Council may invite any other local public or private agency or group that funds, advocates, or provides services to children to have a representative become a permanent or temporary member of the Council.

The purpose of the County Council is to streamline and coordinate existing government services for families seeking services for their children. In seeking to fulfill its purpose, a County Council shall provide the following:

- Referrals to the Cabinet Council those children for whom the County Council cannot provide adequate services;
- b. Development and implementation of a process that annually evaluates and prioritizes services, fills service gaps where possible, and invents new approaches to achieve better results for families of children;
- c. Participate in the development of a county wide, comprehensive, coordinated, multi-disciplinary, interagency system for infants and toddlers with developmental disabilities or delays and their families, as established pursuant to federal grants received and administered by the Department of Health for early intervention services under the "Individuals with Disabilities Education Act of 2004";
- d. Maintenance of an accountability system to monitor the County Council's progress in achieving results for families and children; and,
- e. Establishment of a mechanism to ensure ongoing input from a broad representation of families who are receiving services within the County system.

#### NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

As discussed further in Note 2.B., these financial statements for the Richland County Family and Children First Council (the "Council") are presented on a cash basis of accounting. This cash basis of accounting differs from accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP). GAAP includes all relevant Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) pronouncements, which have been applied to the extent they are applicable to the cash basis of accounting. In cases where these cash basis statements contain items that are the same as, or similar to, those items in the financial statements prepared in conformity with GAAP, similar informative disclosures are provided. Following are the more significant of the Council's accounting policies:

#### A. Reporting Entity

A reporting entity is comprised of the primary government and other organizations that are included to ensure that the financial statements are not misleading. The primary government of the Council consists of all funds, departments and activities that are not legally separate from the Council. They comprise the Council's legal entity which provides various services including human, social, health and educational services to families and children. The Council, the Executive Committee and the Executive Director have direct responsibility for these activities.

### NOTES TO THE BASIC FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2020

#### NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES - (Continued)

#### B. Basis of Accounting

The Council's financial statements are prepared using the cash basis of accounting. Receipts are recorded in the Council's financial records and reported in the financial statements when cash is received rather than when earned and disbursements are recorded when cash is paid rather than when a liability is incurred. These statements include adequate disclosure of material matters, in accordance with the basis of accounting described in this paragraph.

As a result of the use of this cash basis of accounting, certain assets and their related revenues (such as accounts receivable and revenue for billed or provided services not yet collected) and certain liabilities and their related expenses (such as accounts payable and expenses for goods or services received, but not yet paid and accrued expenses and liabilities) are not recorded in these financial statements.

#### C. Fund Accounting

The Council uses funds to maintain its financial records during the year. Fund accounting is a concept developed to meet the needs of governmental entities in which legal or other restraints require the recording of specific receipts and disbursements. The transactions of each fund are reflected in a self-balancing group of accounts. The Council reports only governmental funds.

**Governmental Funds** - The Council classifies funds financed primarily from intergovernmental receipts (e.g. grants) and other nonexchange transactions as governmental funds. The following are the Council's major governmental funds:

<u>General</u> - The general fund is the operating fund of the Council. It is used to account for all financial resources except those required to be accounted for in another fund.

<u>Help Me Grow</u> - This fund receives Federal and State funds to implement and maintain a coordinated, community-based infrastructure that promotes trans-disciplinary, family-centered services for expectant parents, newborns, infants and toddlers and their families.

Other governmental funds of the Council are used to account for grants and other resources whose use is restricted to an expenditure for specified purposes.

#### D. Basis of Presentation and Measurement Focus

Government-Wide Statement of Activities - Cash Basis - This statement displays information about the Council as a whole. The government-wide statement of activities - cash basis compares disbursements with program receipts for each function or program of the Council's governmental activities. These disbursements are those that are specifically associated with a service, program or department and are therefore clearly identifiable to a particular function. Program receipts include grants and contributions that are restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a particular program. Receipts which are not classified as program receipts are presented as general receipts of the Council. The comparison of direct disbursements with program receipts identifies the extent to which each governmental function is self-financing on the cash basis or draws from the general receipts of the Council.

#### NOTES TO THE BASIC FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2020

#### NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES - (Continued)

<u>Fund Financial Statements</u> - Fund financial statements report detailed information about the Council. The focus of governmental fund financial statements is on major funds. Each major fund is presented in a separate column. Nonmajor funds are aggregated and presented in a single column.

#### E. Budgetary Process

The Ohio Revised Code Section 121.37 (B)(4) requires the Council to file an annual budget with its administrative agent. For fiscal year 2020, a budget was prepared and filed based on the administrative agency (Richland County Job and Family Services) fiscal year, July 1, 2020 through June 30, 2021.

#### F. Administrative/Fiscal Agent

Section 121.37 (B)(5)(a) of the Ohio Revised Code, requires each county council to designate an administrative agent for the council. Richland County Job and Family Services (the "County") serves as the Council's administrative agent. The County maintains the Council as an agency fund on their financial records. The administrative agent agrees to:

- 1. Serve as the Council's appointing authority;
- 2. Exercise spending authority within the limits of the annual budget developed and approved by the Council; and.
- Perform the following on behalf of Council; but only upon the expressed approval of and direction by Council;
  - Enter into written agreements or administer contracts with public or private entities to fulfill specific Council business.
  - Provide financial stipends, reimbursements or both to family representatives for expenses related to Council activity.
  - Receive by gift, grant, devise or bequest any moneys, land or other property for the purposes for which the Council is established.

#### G. Capital Assets

Acquisition of property, plant and equipment purchased are recorded as disbursements when paid. These items are not reflected as assets on the accompanying financial statements.

#### H. Fund Cash Balance

The Council reports classifications of fund cash balance based on the extent to which the Council is bound to honor constraints on the specific purposes for which amounts in those funds can be spent. The following categories are used:

Nonspendable - amounts that cannot be spent because they are either (a) not in spendable form or (b) legally required to be maintained intact.

Restricted - amounts that have constraints placed on the use of resources that are either (a) externally imposed by creditors, grantors, contributors, or laws or regulations of other governments, or (b) imposed by law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation.

### NOTES TO THE BASIC FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2020

#### NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES - (Continued)

Committed - amounts that can only be used for specific purposes pursuant to constraints imposed by formal action of the Council's highest level of decision-making authority, Cabinet Council.

Assigned - amounts that are constrained by the Council's intent to be used for specific purpose, but are neither restricted nor committed. Assigned amounts include those approved through the Council's formal purchasing procedure by the fiscal agent. Through the Council's purchasing policy, the Cabinet Council has given the fiscal agent the authority to constrain monies for intended purposes.

Unassigned - residual fund balance within the general fund that is in spendable form that is not restricted, committed, or assigned.

The Council applies restricted resources first when an expense is incurred for purposes for which restricted and unrestricted fund balance is available. The Council considers committed, assigned, and unassigned fund balances, respectively, to be spent when expenditures are incurred for purposes for which any of the unrestricted fund balance classifications could be used.

#### I. Net Position

Net position is reported as restricted when enabling legislation or creditors, grantors or laws or regulations of other governments have imposed limitations on their use. The Council has no net position restricted by enabling legislation.

The Council first applies restricted resources when a disbursement is incurred for purposes for which both restricted and unrestricted net position are available.

#### J. Contracted Services

The Council director is an employee of Richland County and paid directly by the Council. The assistant of the Council is a paid employee of the City of Mansfield and the Council reimburses the cost of her payroll to the City of Mansfield. The funds used to pay their salaries are derived from a State Administrative grant and local agency membership contributions received by the Council and maintained by the County.

#### **NOTE 3 - EQUITY IN POOLED CASH**

The Richland County Treasurer's Office maintains a depository which includes the funds of the Council. The Ohio Revised Code prescribes allowable deposits and investments. The Council's carrying amount of cash on deposit with the fiscal agent at December 31, 2020, was \$1,973,989. The fiscal agent for the Council is responsible for maintaining adequate depository collateral for all funds in the County's investment accounts.

#### **NOTE 4 - CONTINGENT LIABILITIES**

Amounts received from grantor agencies are subject to audit and adjustment by the grantor. Any disallowed costs may require refunding to the grantor. Amounts which may be disallowed, if any, are not presently determinable. However, based on prior experience, management believes such refunds, if any, would not be material.

#### **NOTE 5 - RISK MANAGEMENT**

Insurance for comprehensive property and general liability is provided by the Council's administrative agent.

#### NOTE 6 - COVID-19

The United States and the State of Ohio declared a state of emergency in March of 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The financial impact of COVID-19 and the continuing emergency measures will impact subsequent periods of the Council. The impact on the Council's future operating costs, revenues, and additional recovery from emergency funding, either federal or state, cannot be estimated.

During 2020, the District received \$50,000 as an on-behalf of grant from Richland County. These amounts are recorded in the Coronavirus Relief Special Revenue Fund, a nonmajor governmental fund.

We have audited, in accordance with the auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, the financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Richland County Family and Children First Council, Richland County, (the Council) as of and for the year ended December 31, 2020, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Council's basic financial statements, and have issued our report thereon dated July 28, 2022, wherein we noted the financial impact of COVID-19 and the ensuing emergency measures will impact subsequent periods of the Council.

#### Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements, we considered the Council's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) to determine the audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Council's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Council's internal control.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct, misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the Council's financial statements will not be prevented or detected and corrected on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies. Given these limitations, during our audit we did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be material weaknesses. However, material weaknesses may exist that have not been identified.
